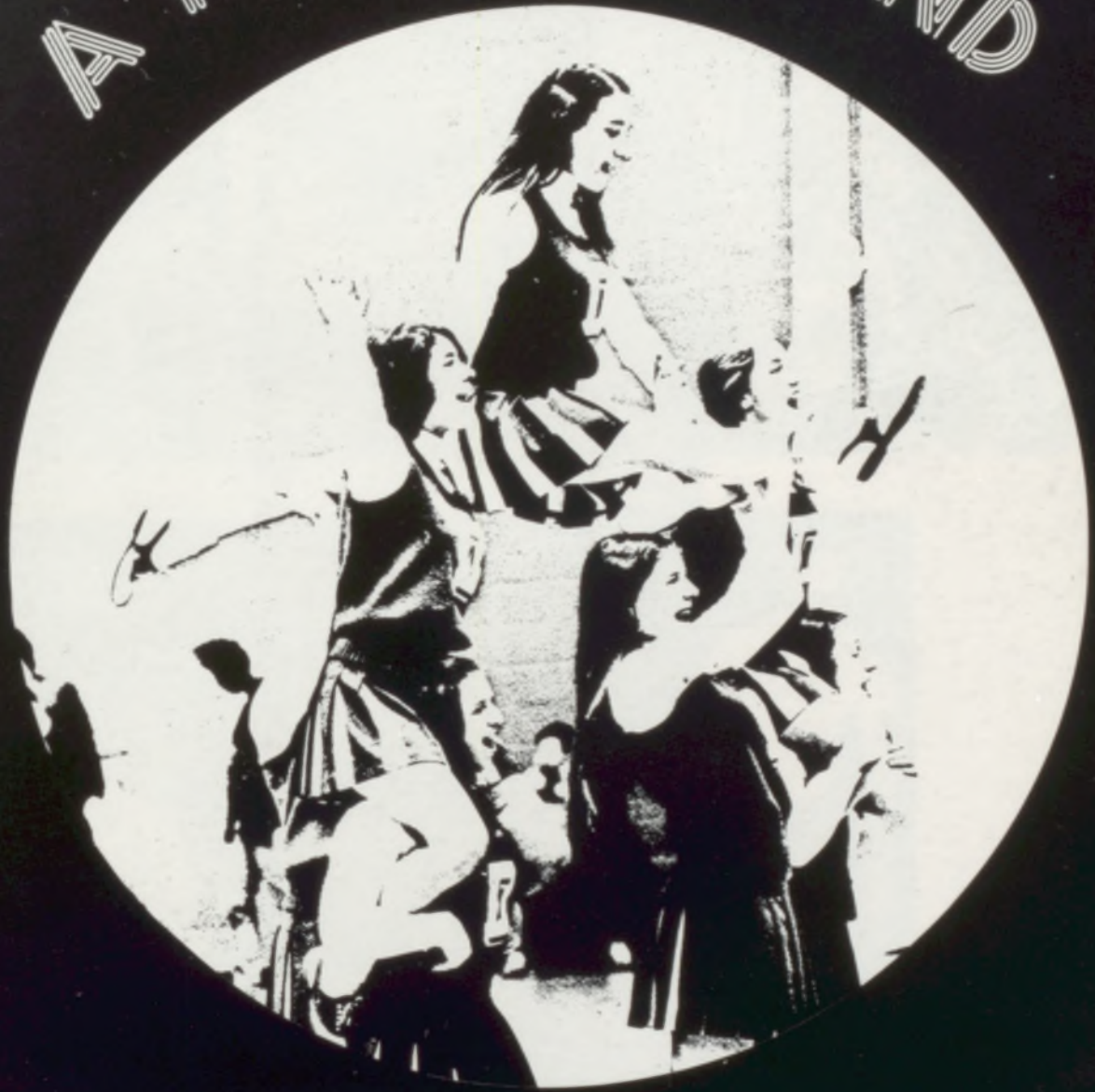

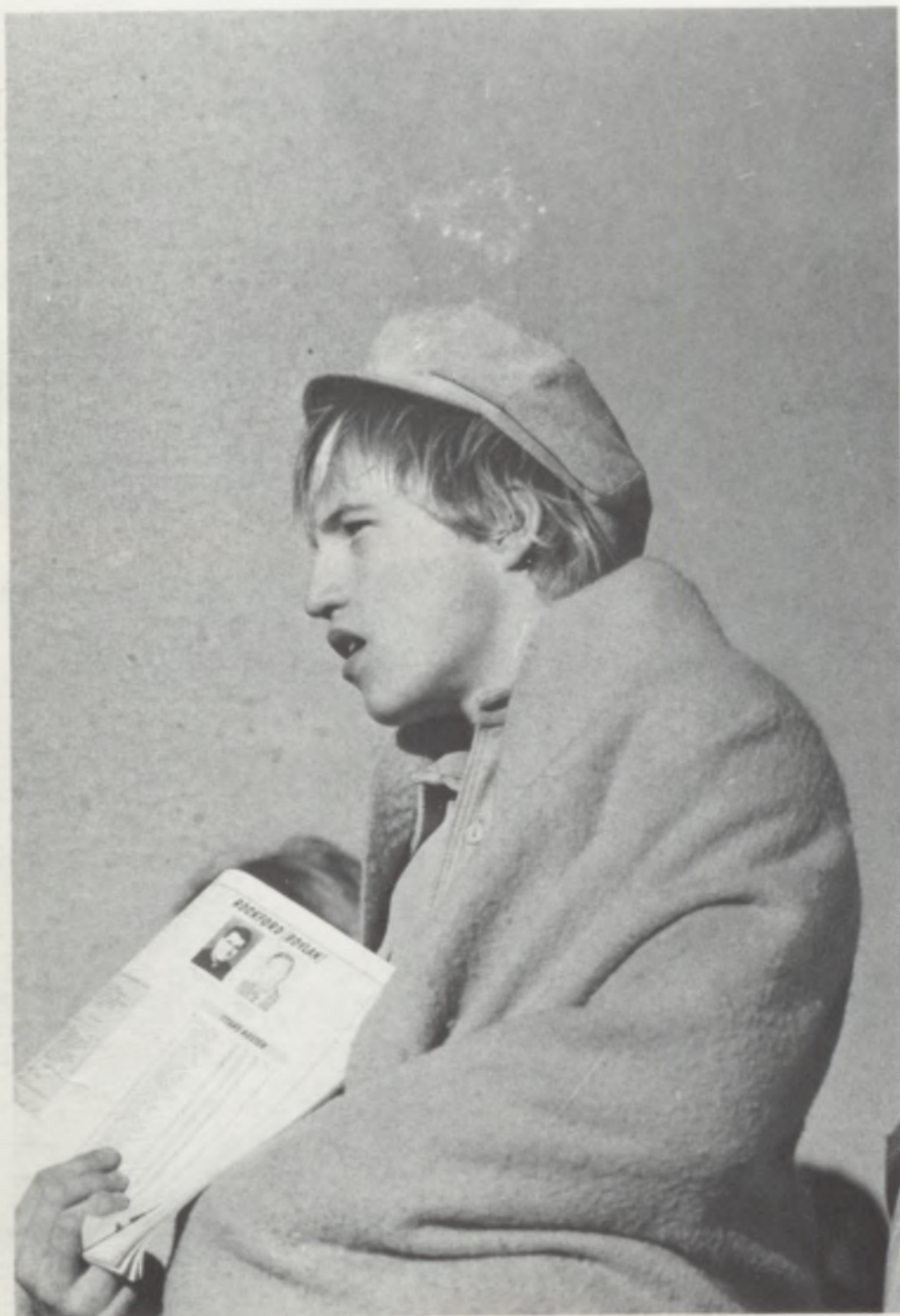

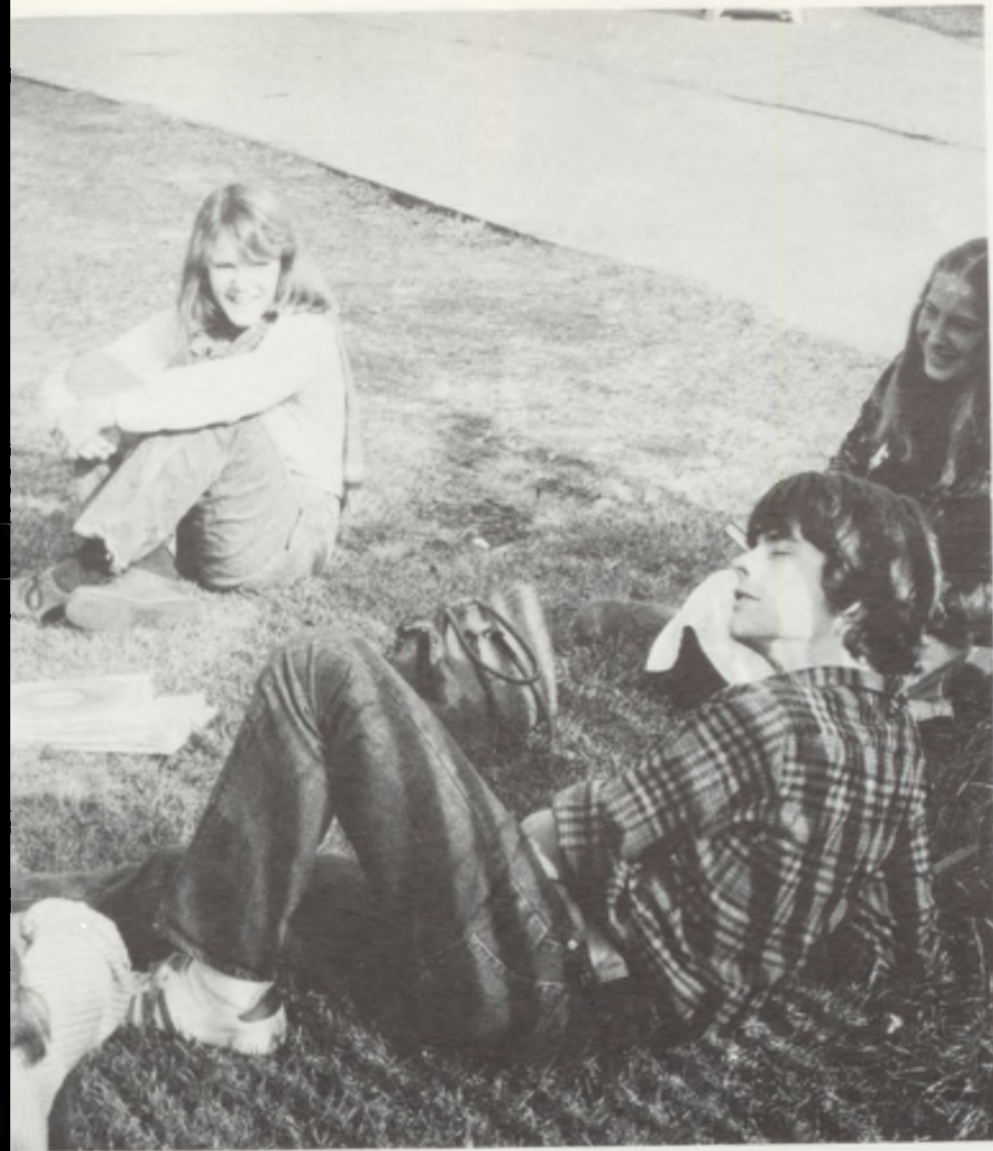

Golfers improve in shadows

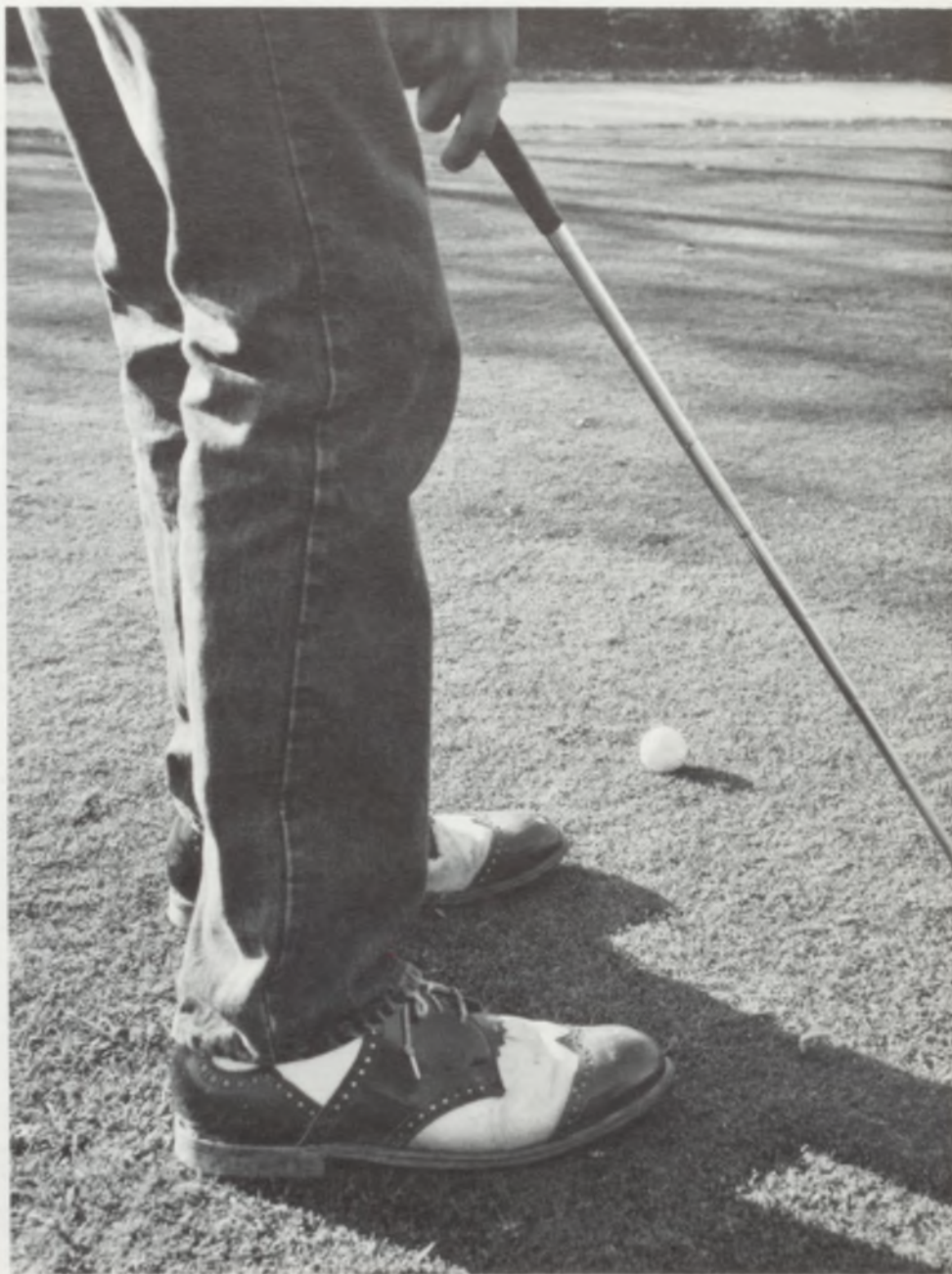

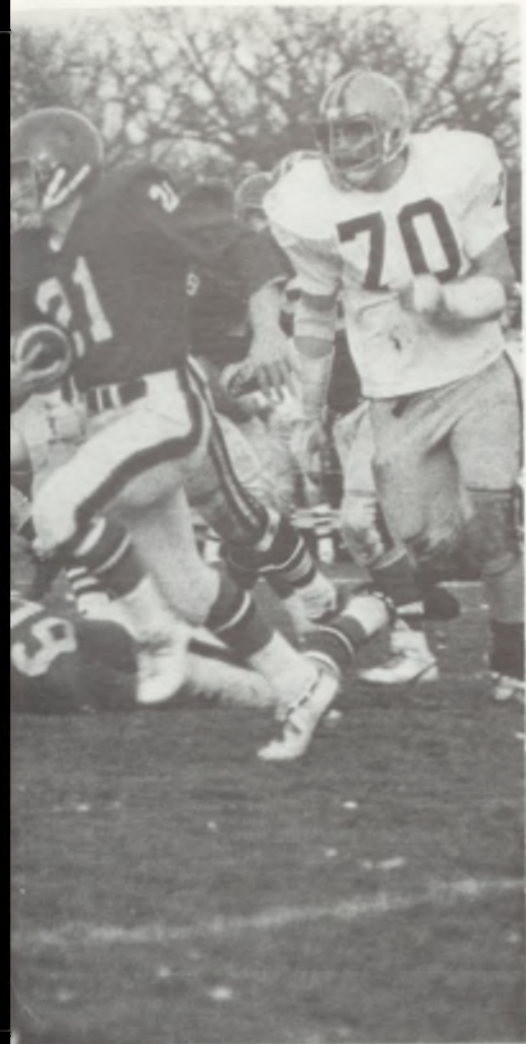

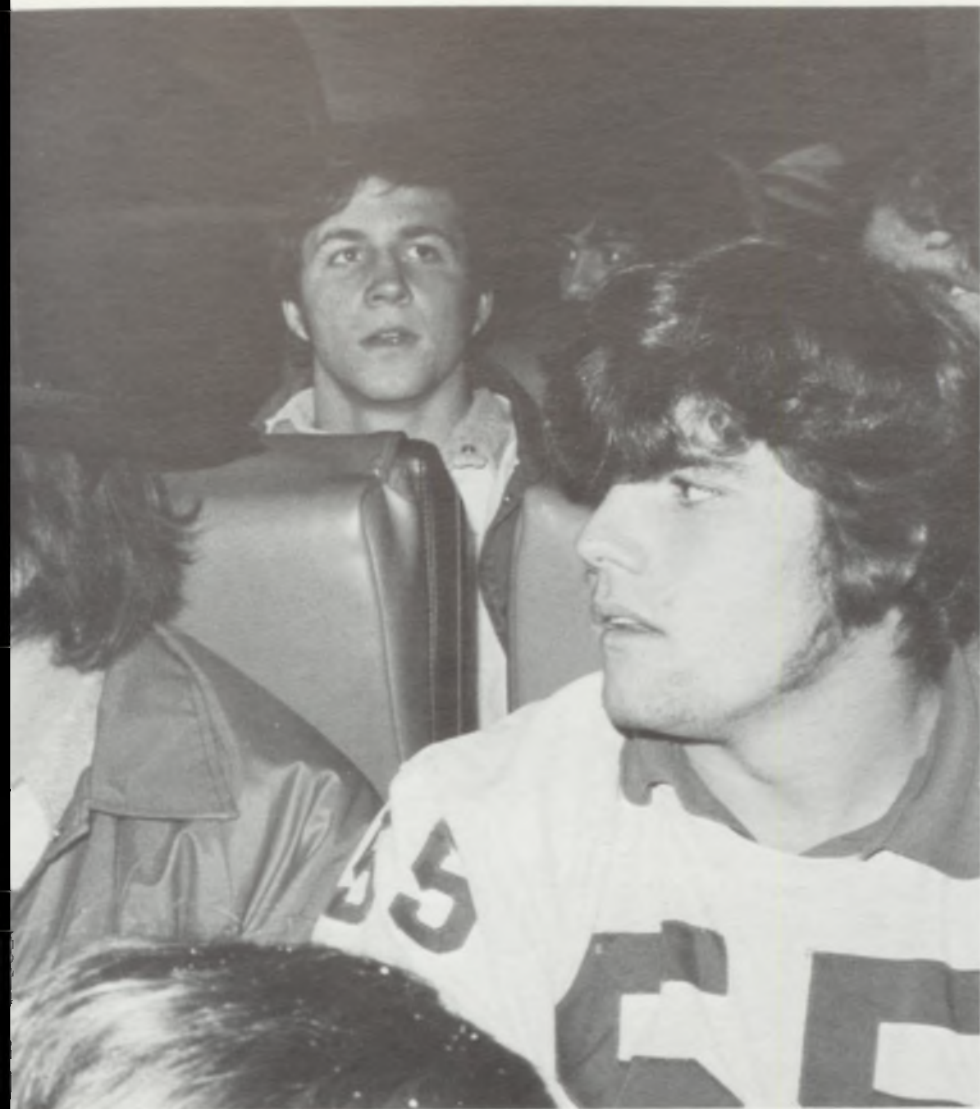

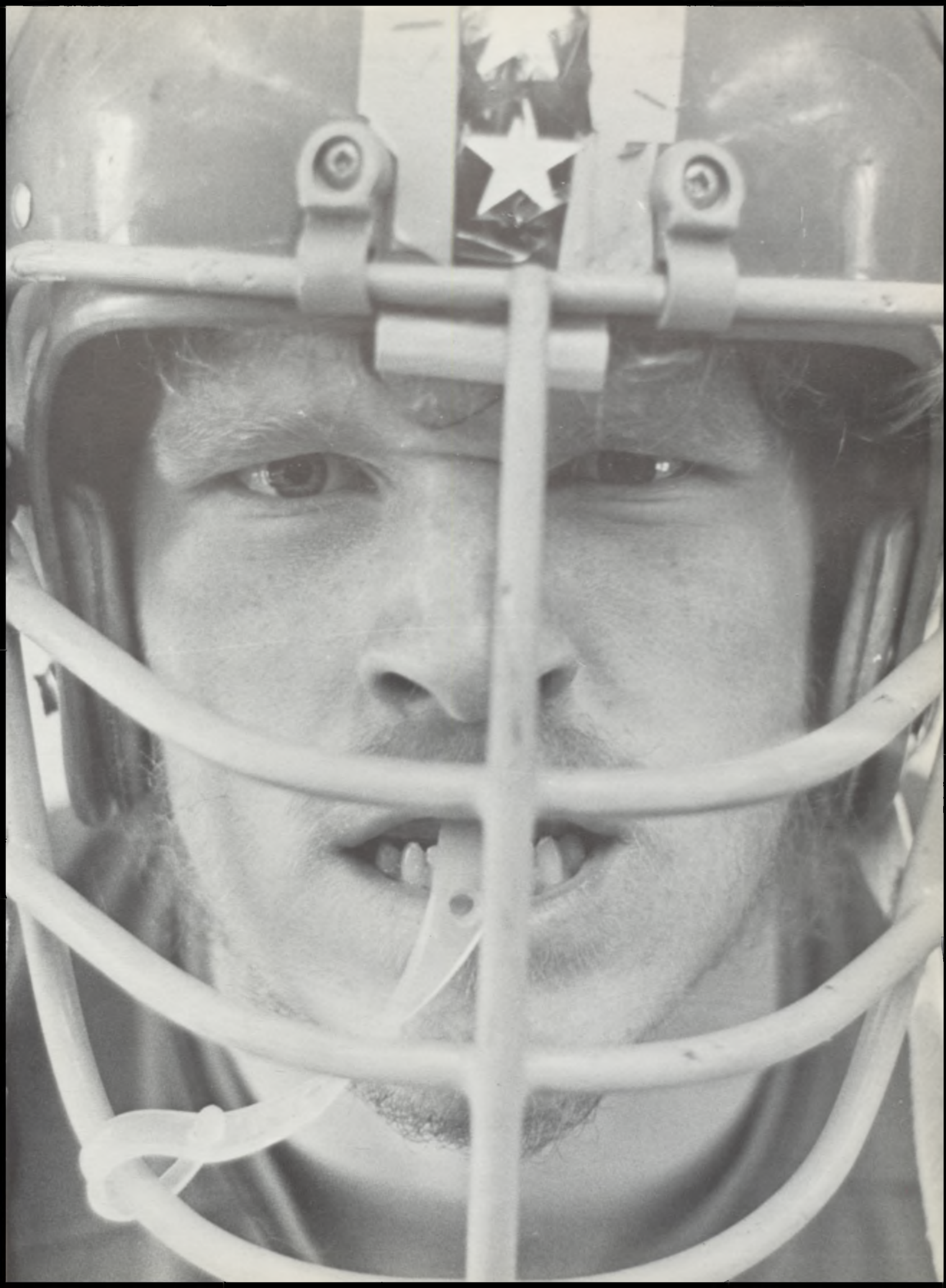

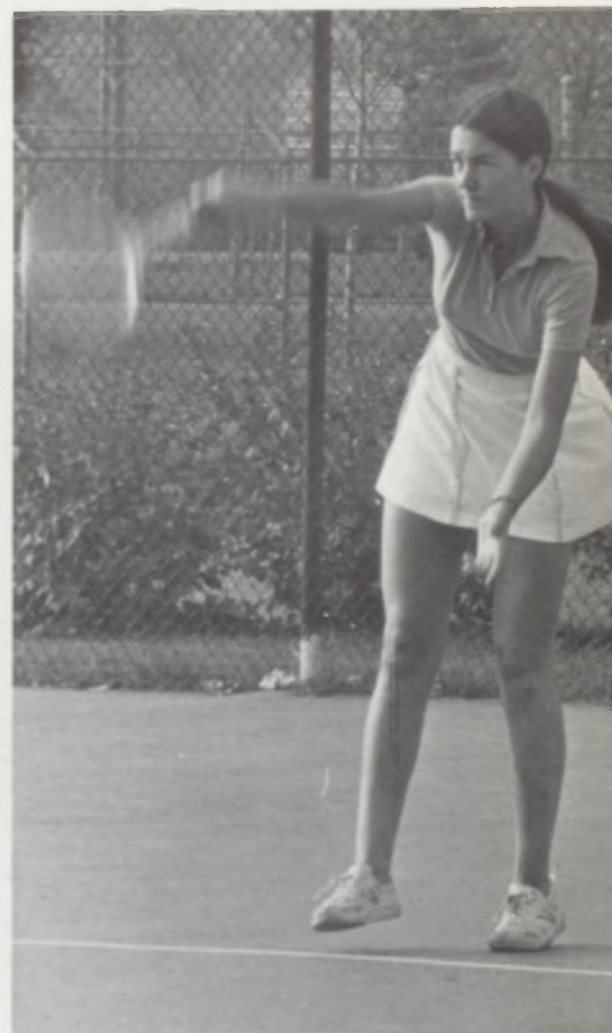

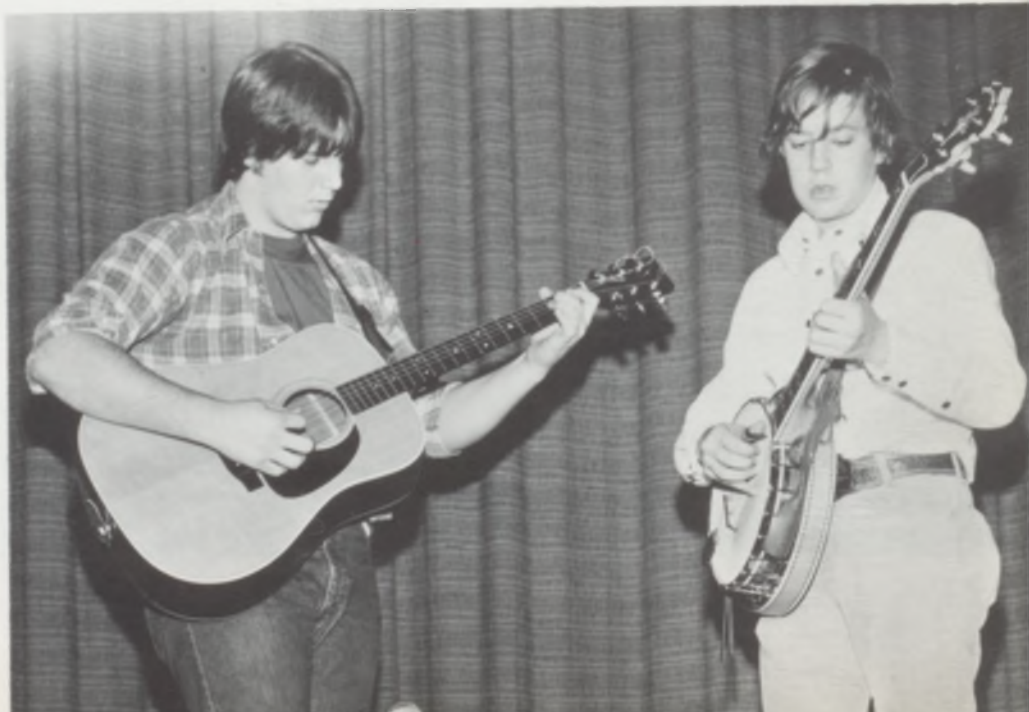

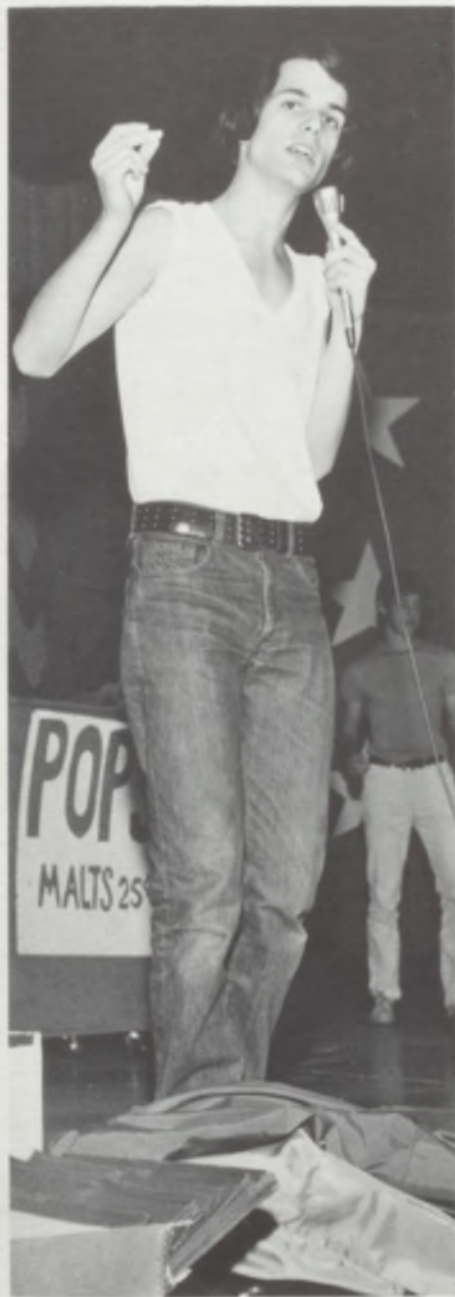


FAR ABOVE: The Stunts' chorus does an arrangement of American folk songs.

Suburban life lacks spice

For the most part, Deerfield remained the peaceful North Shore suburb that it has been over the past few years. 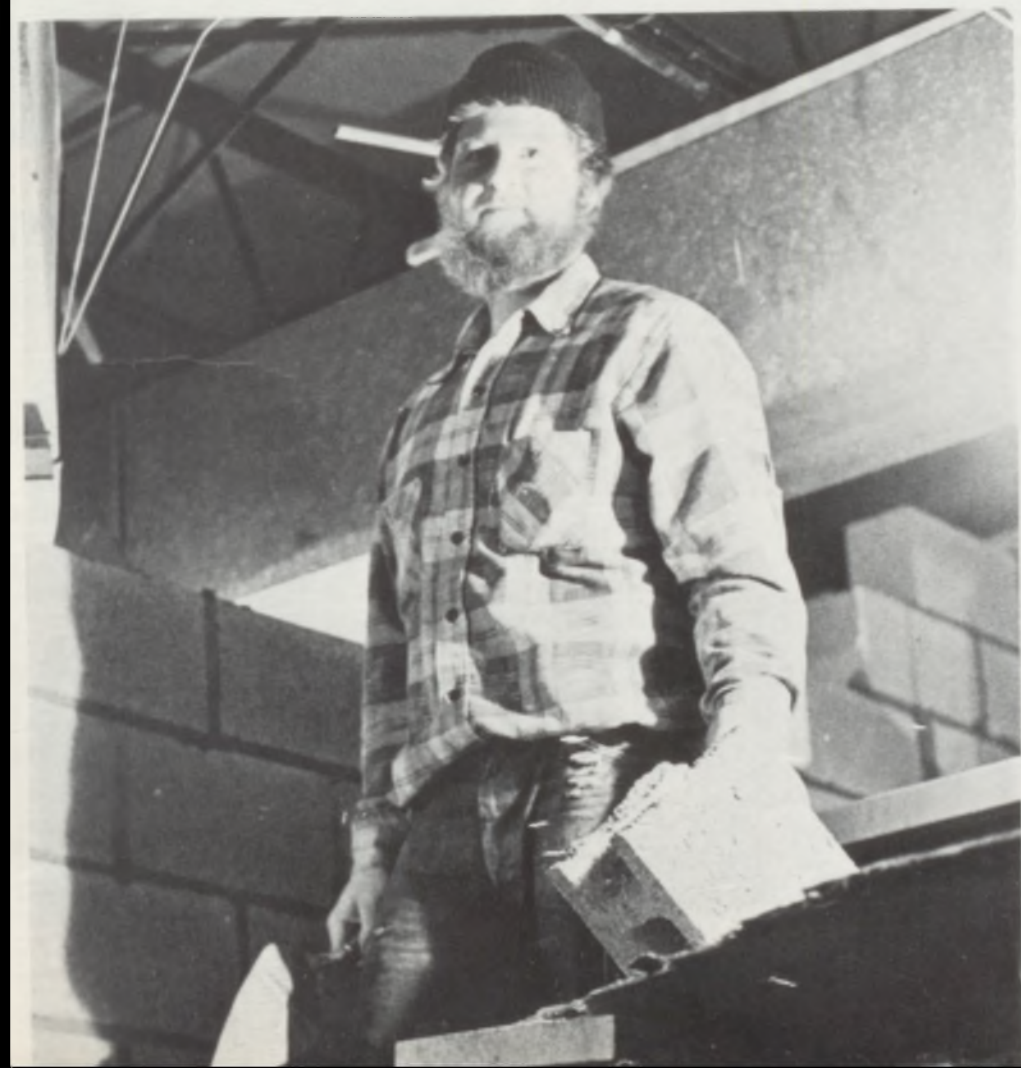

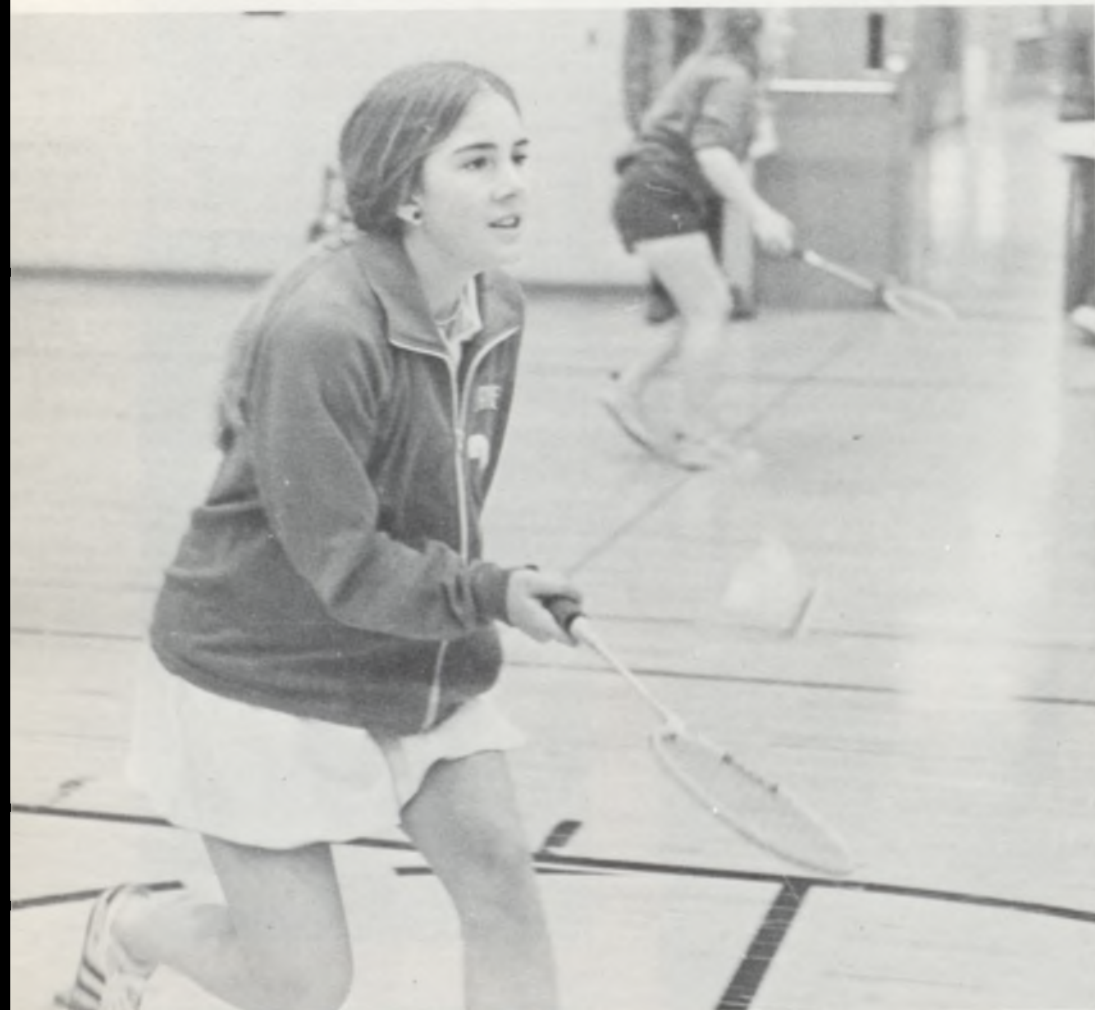

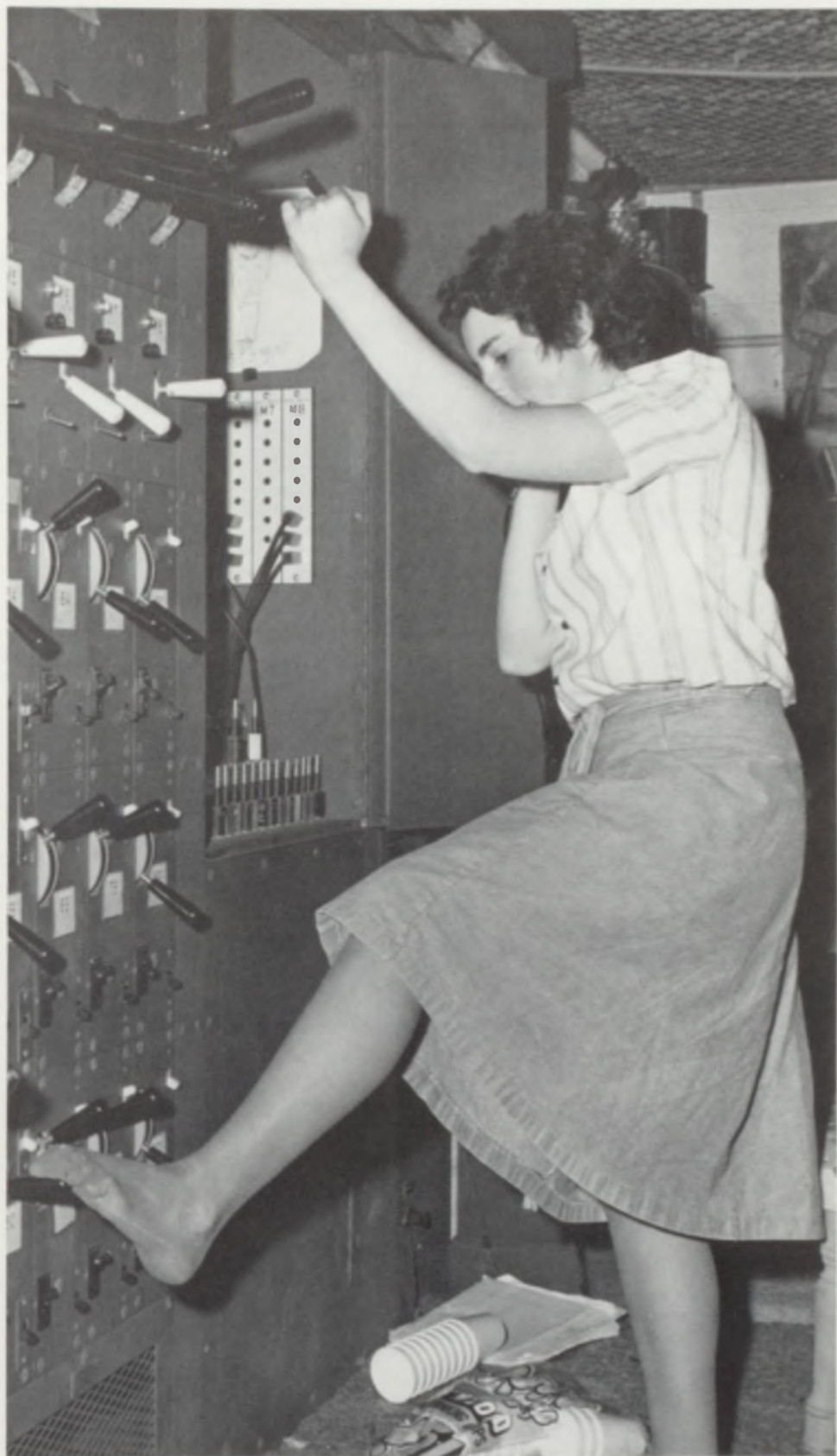

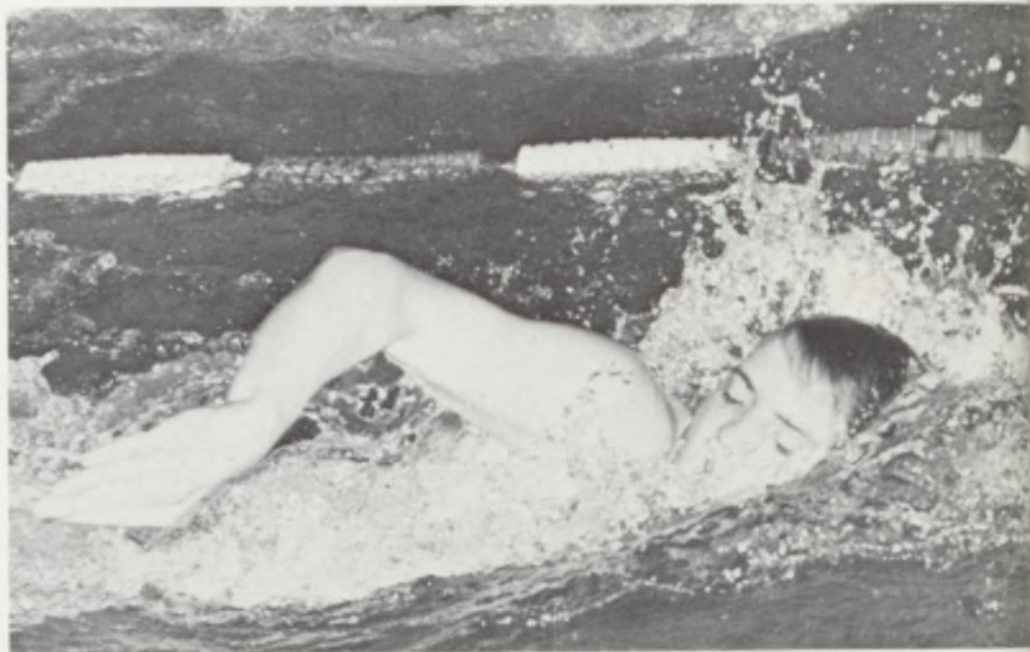

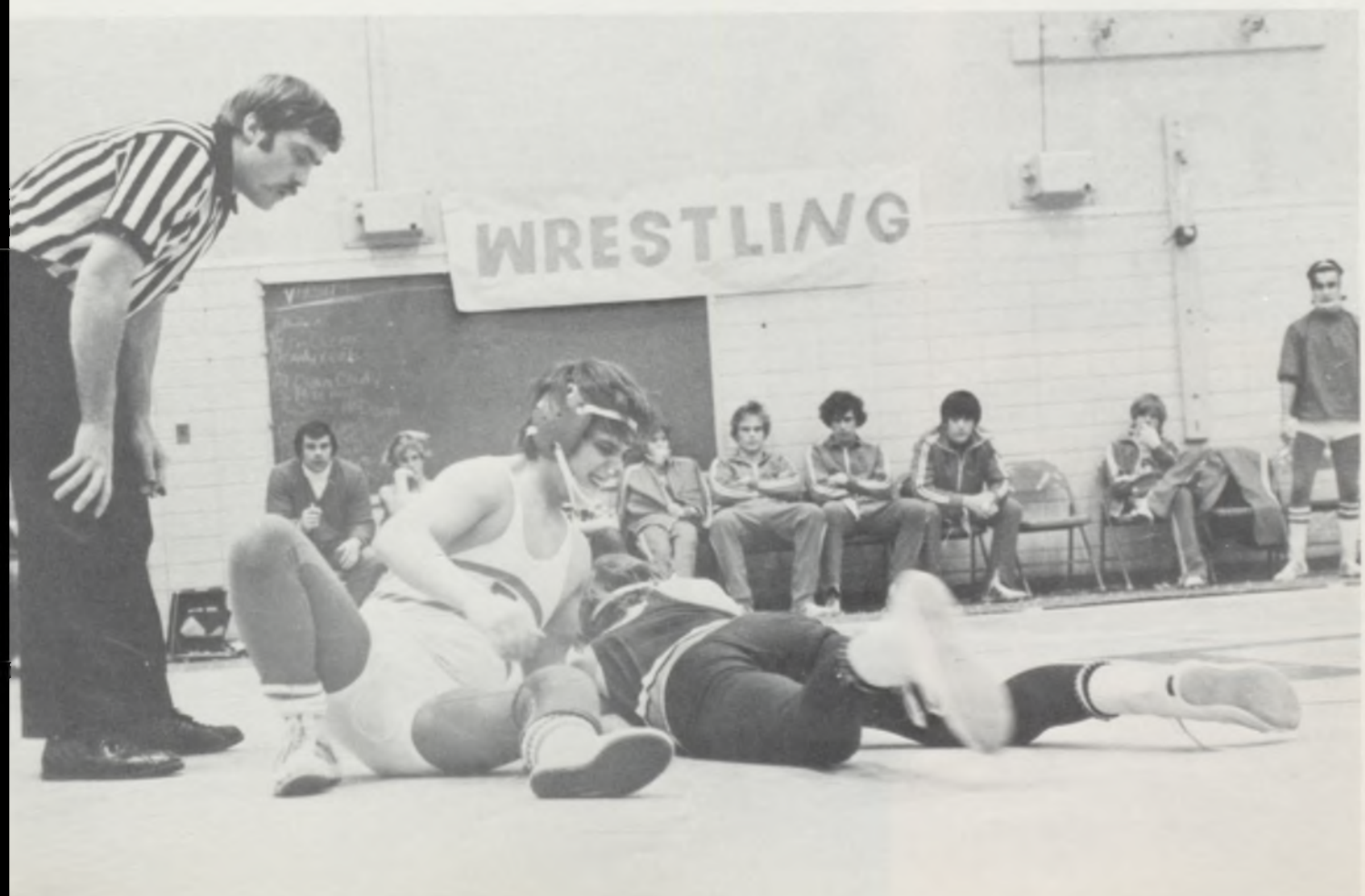

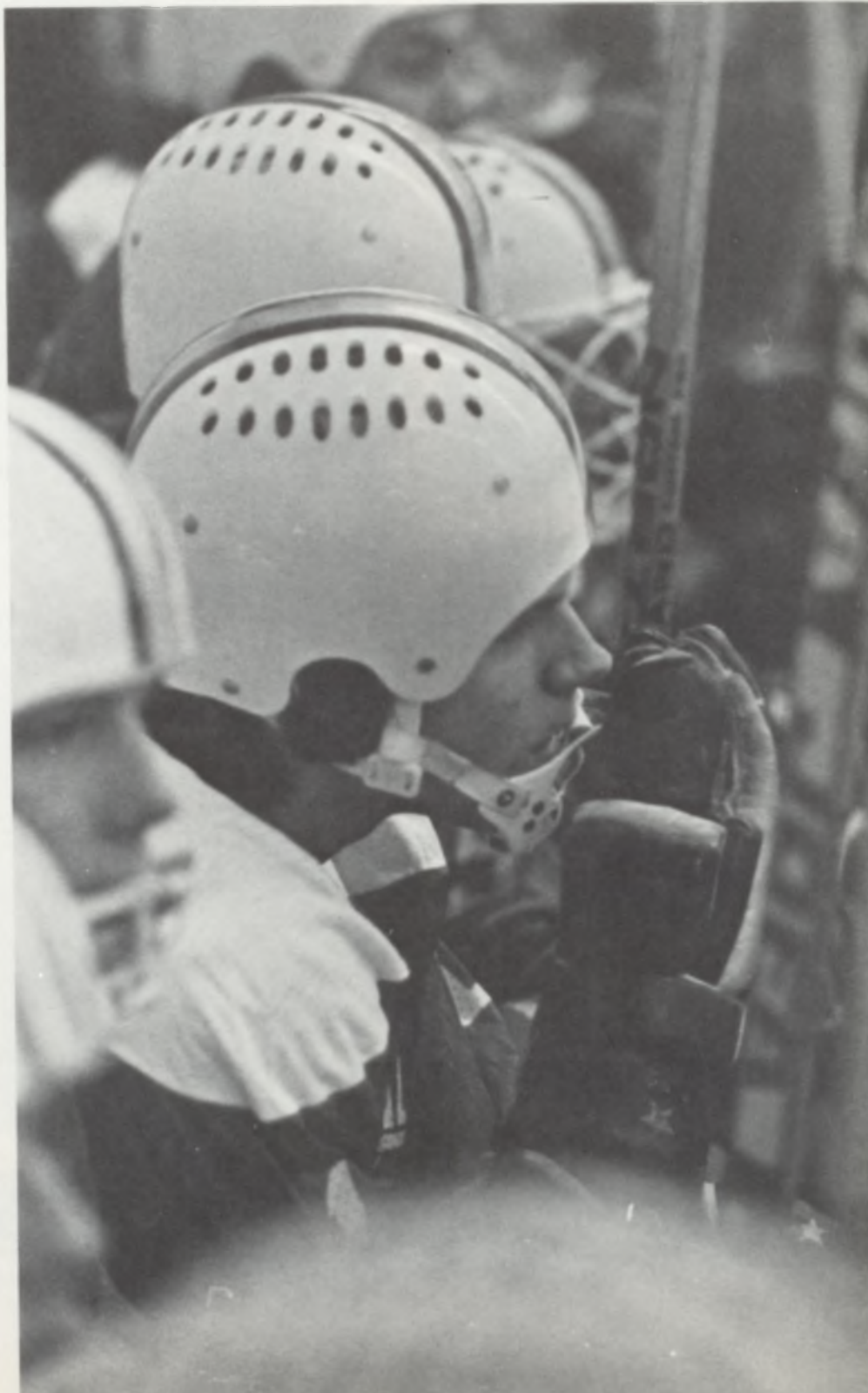

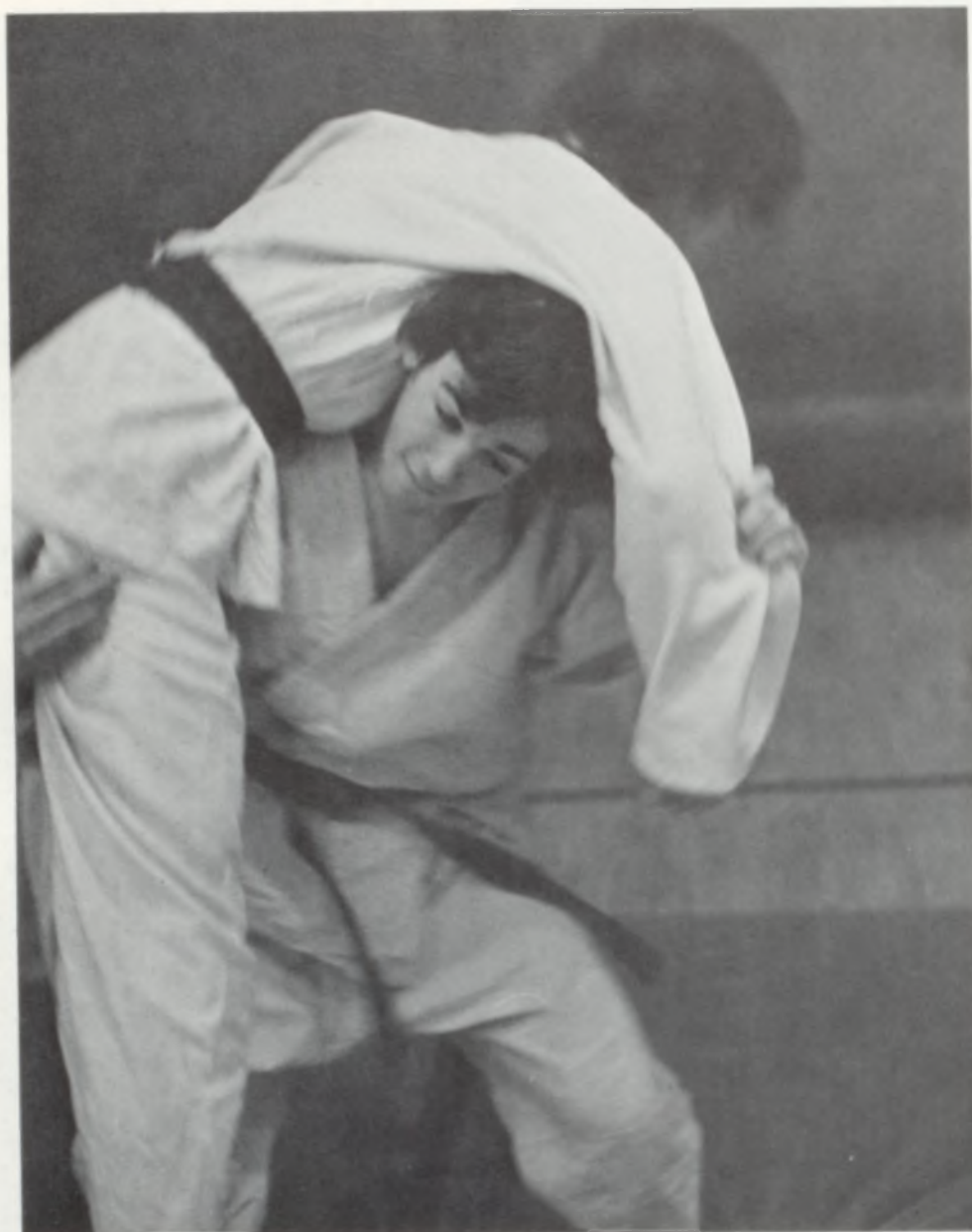

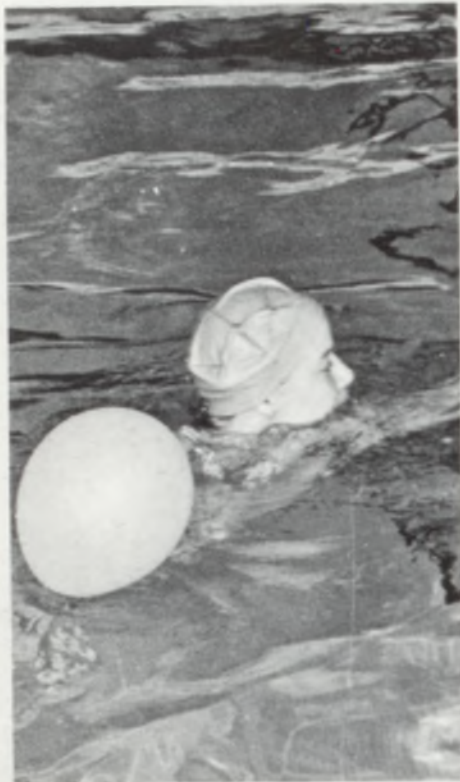

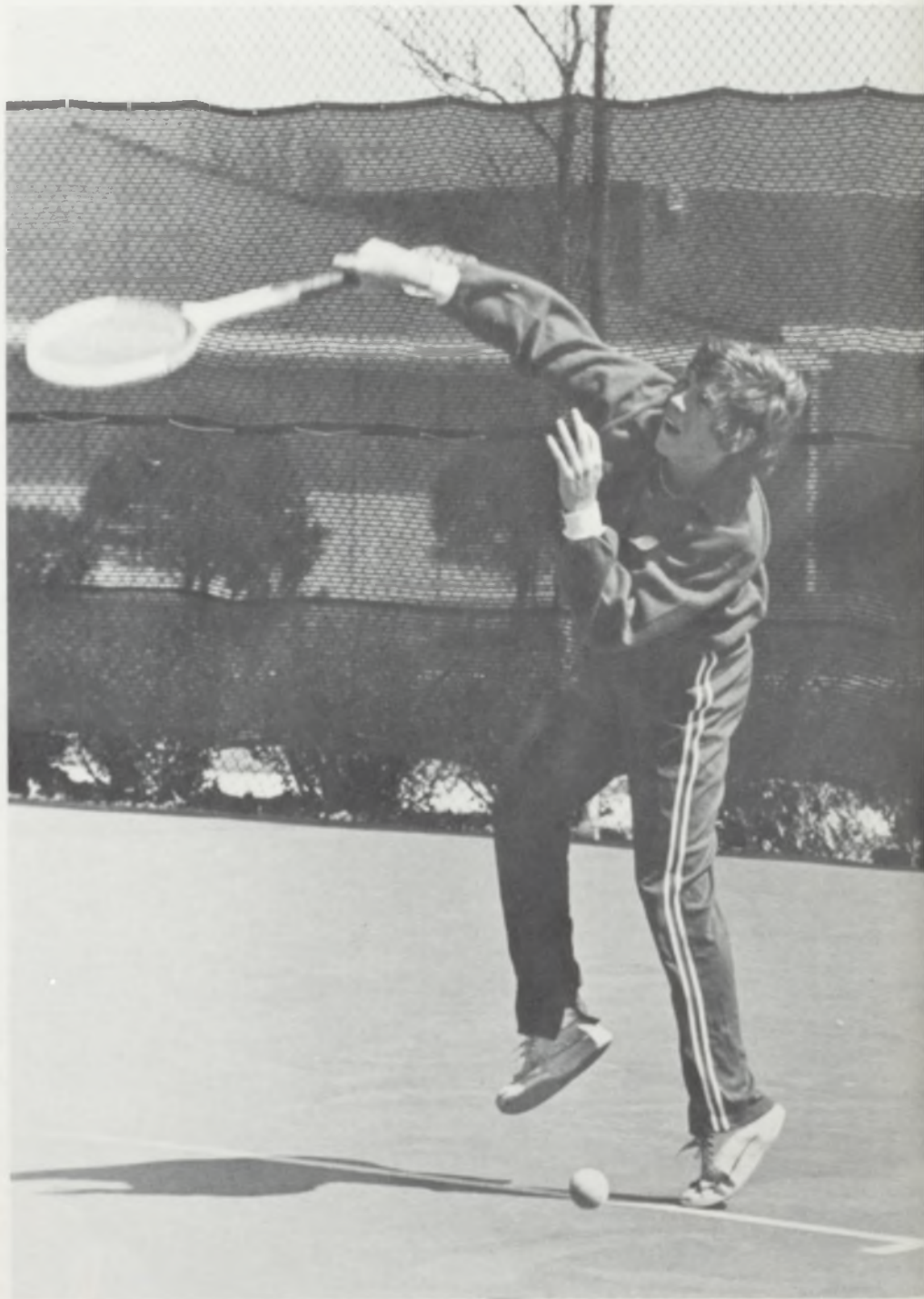

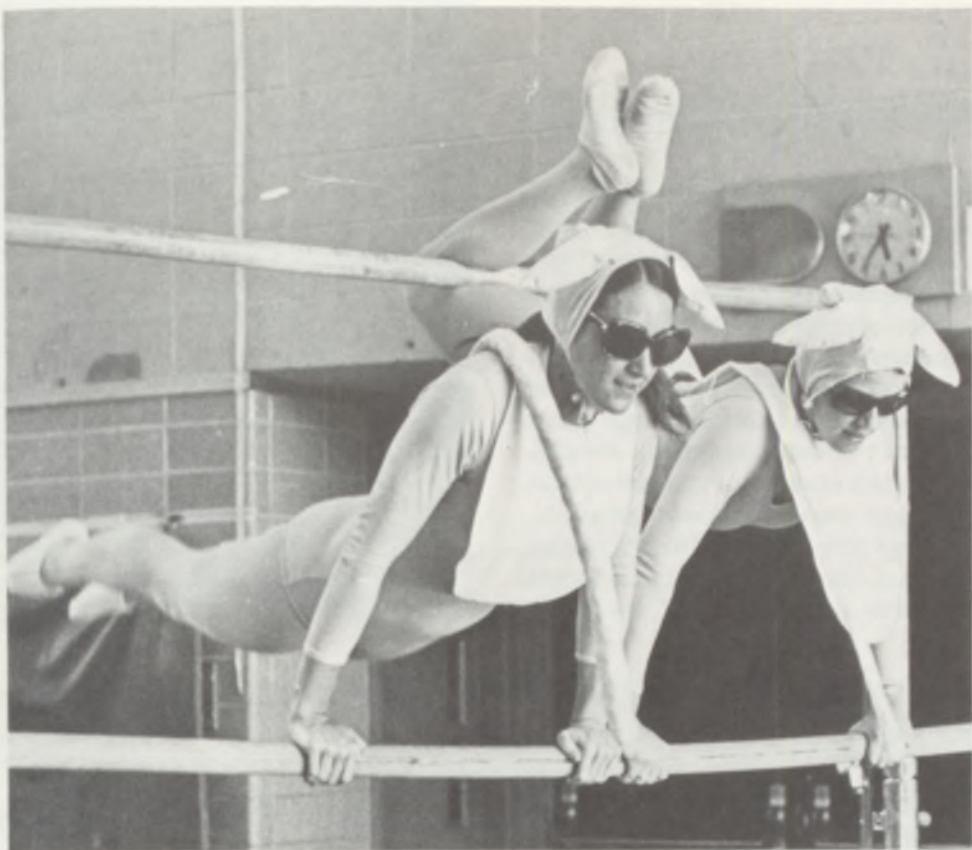

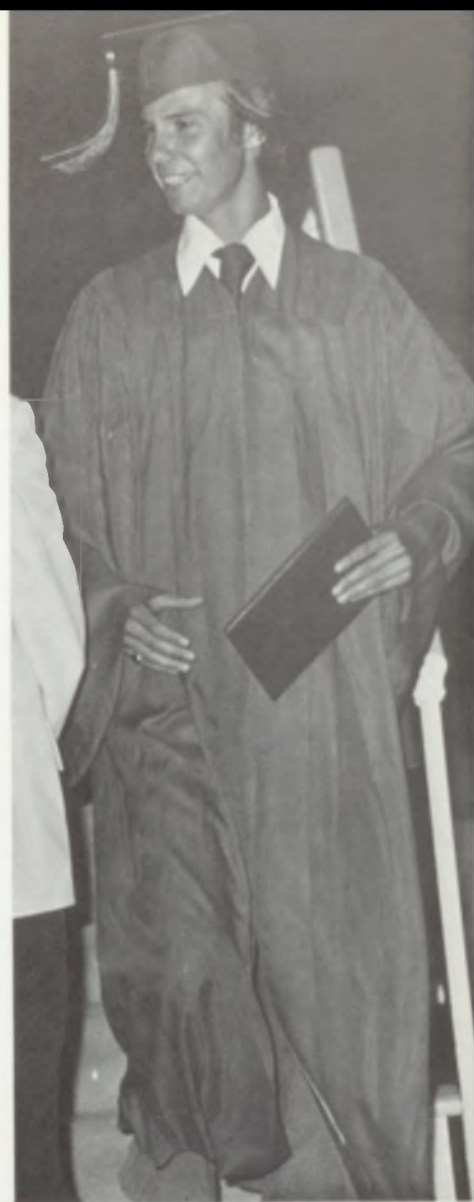

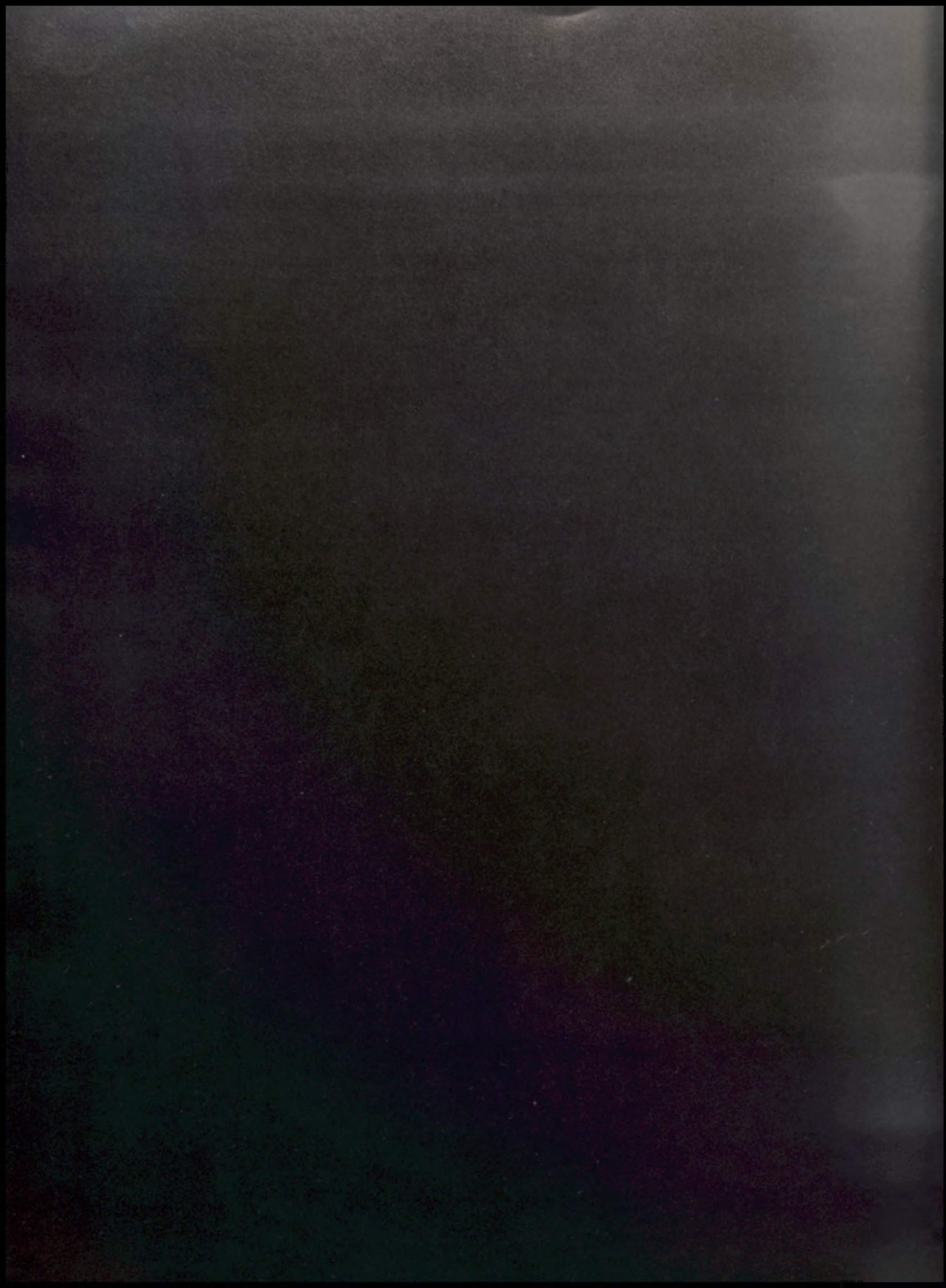

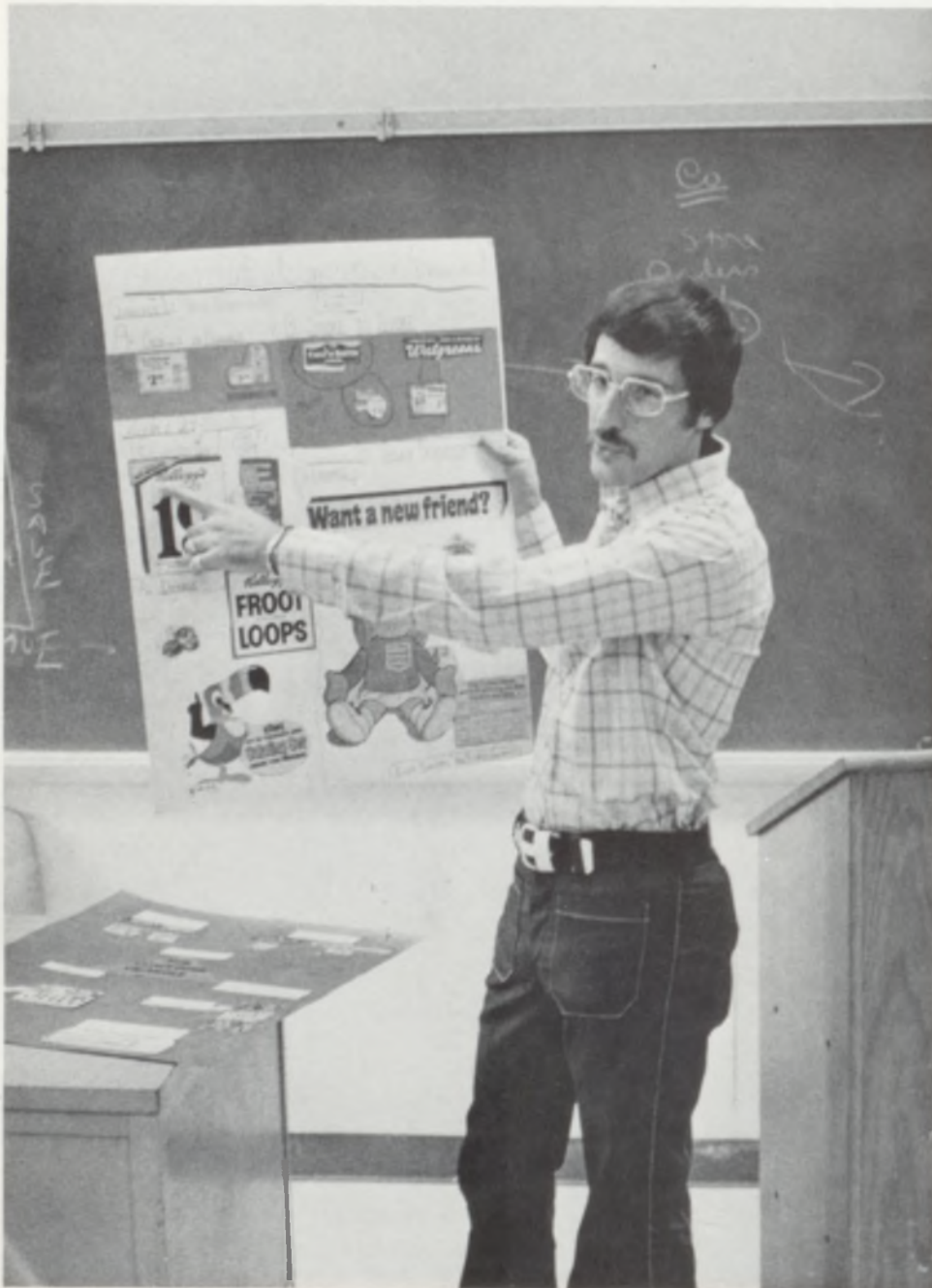

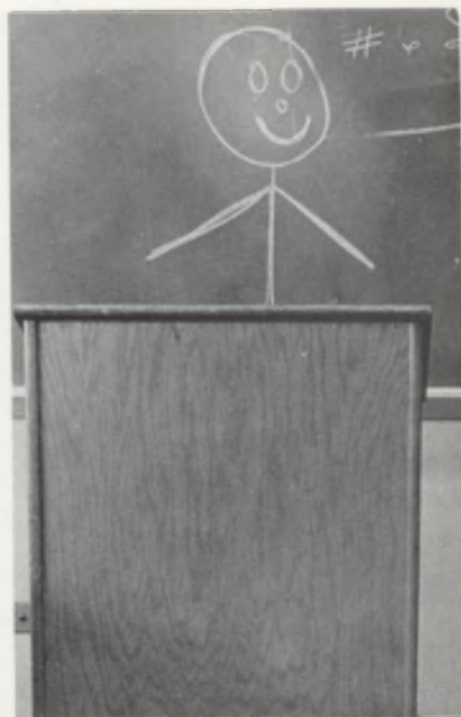

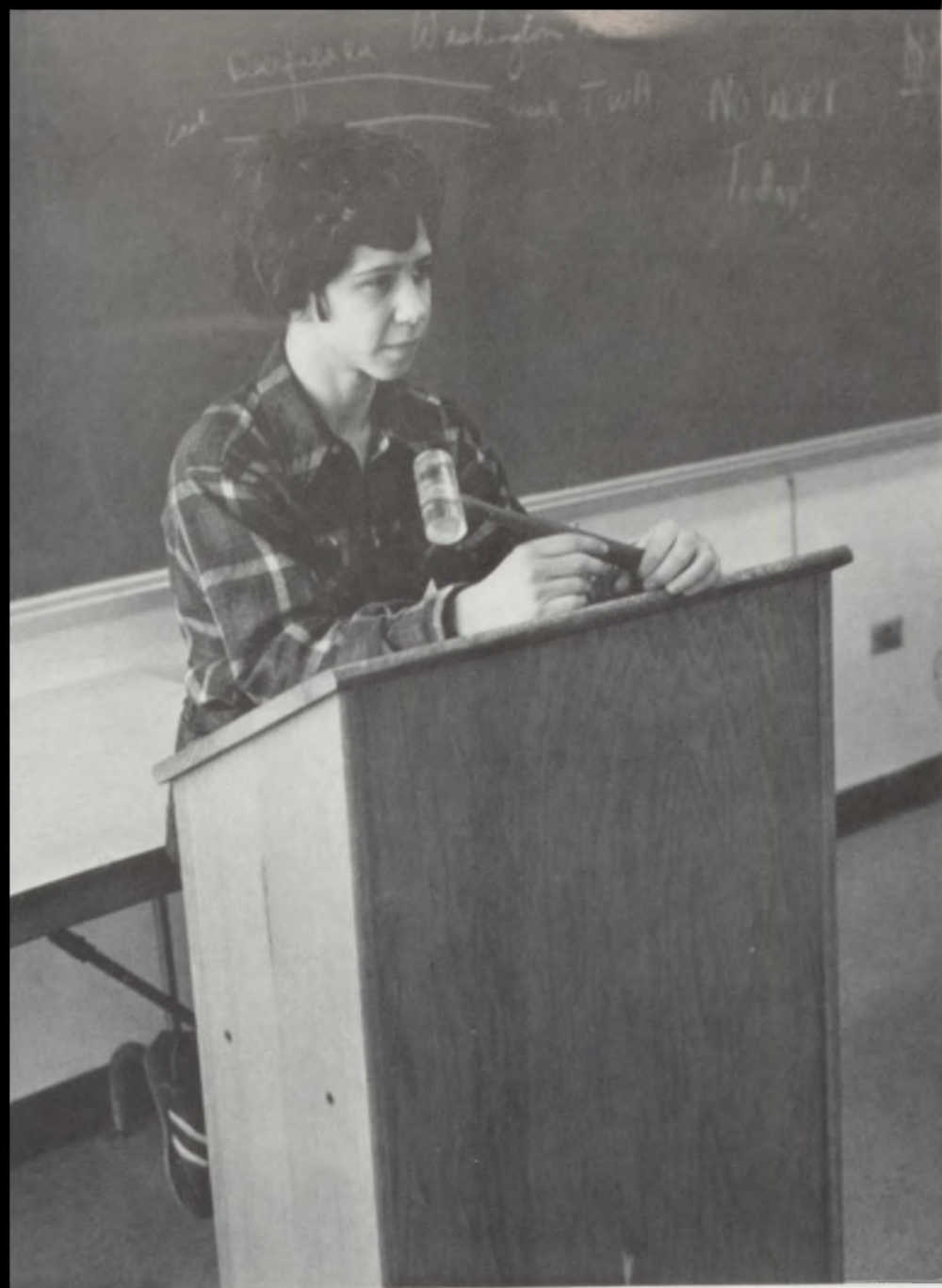

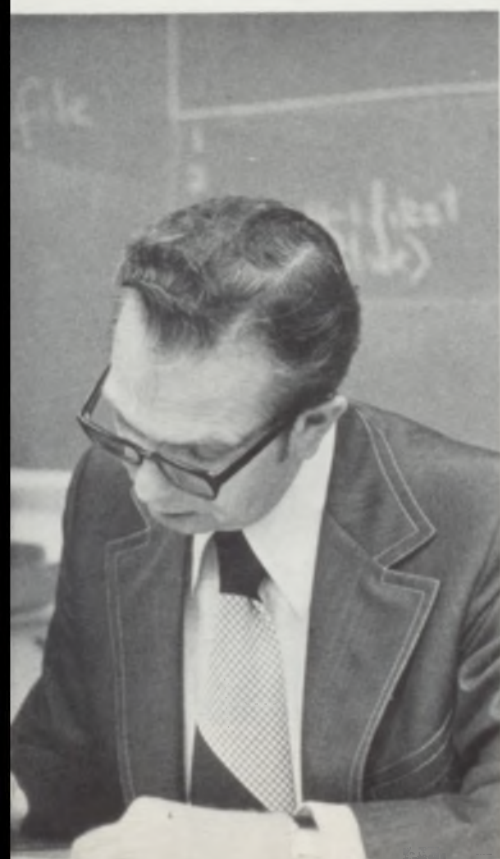

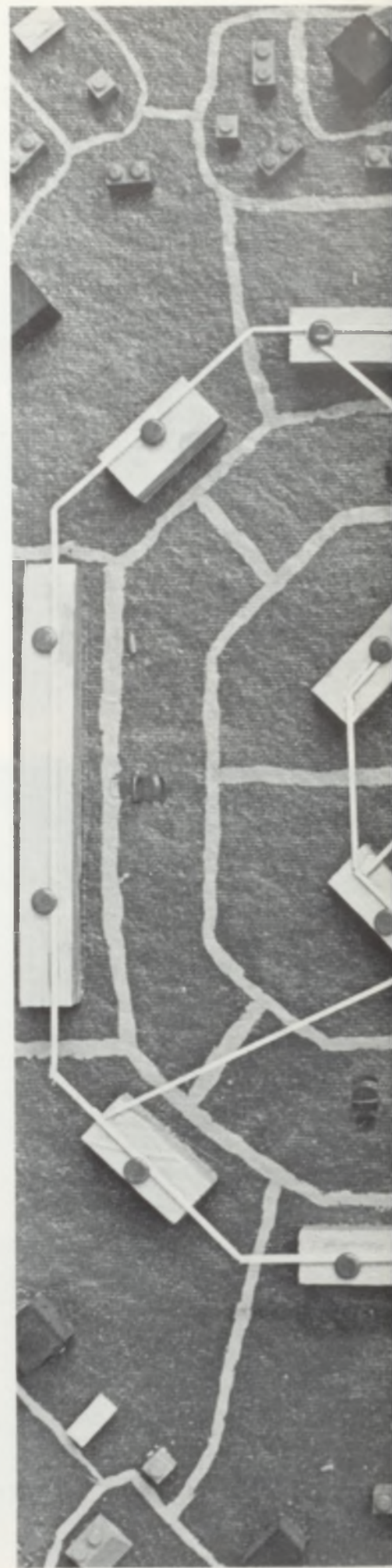
Students view past and present

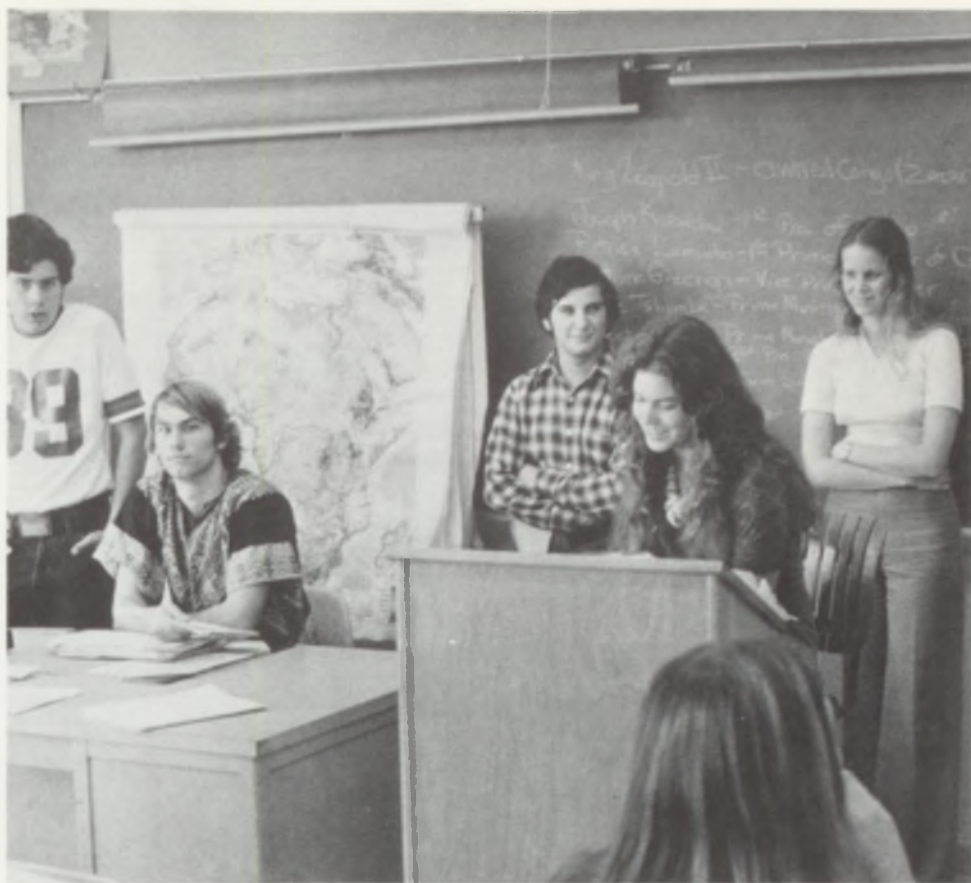
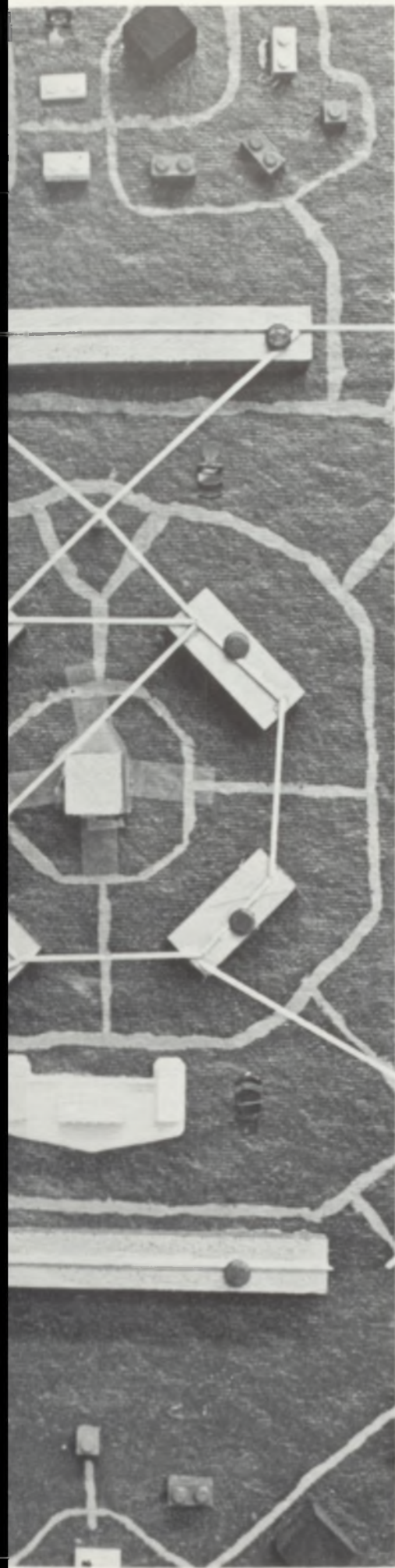

Gym mixes pleasure and skill

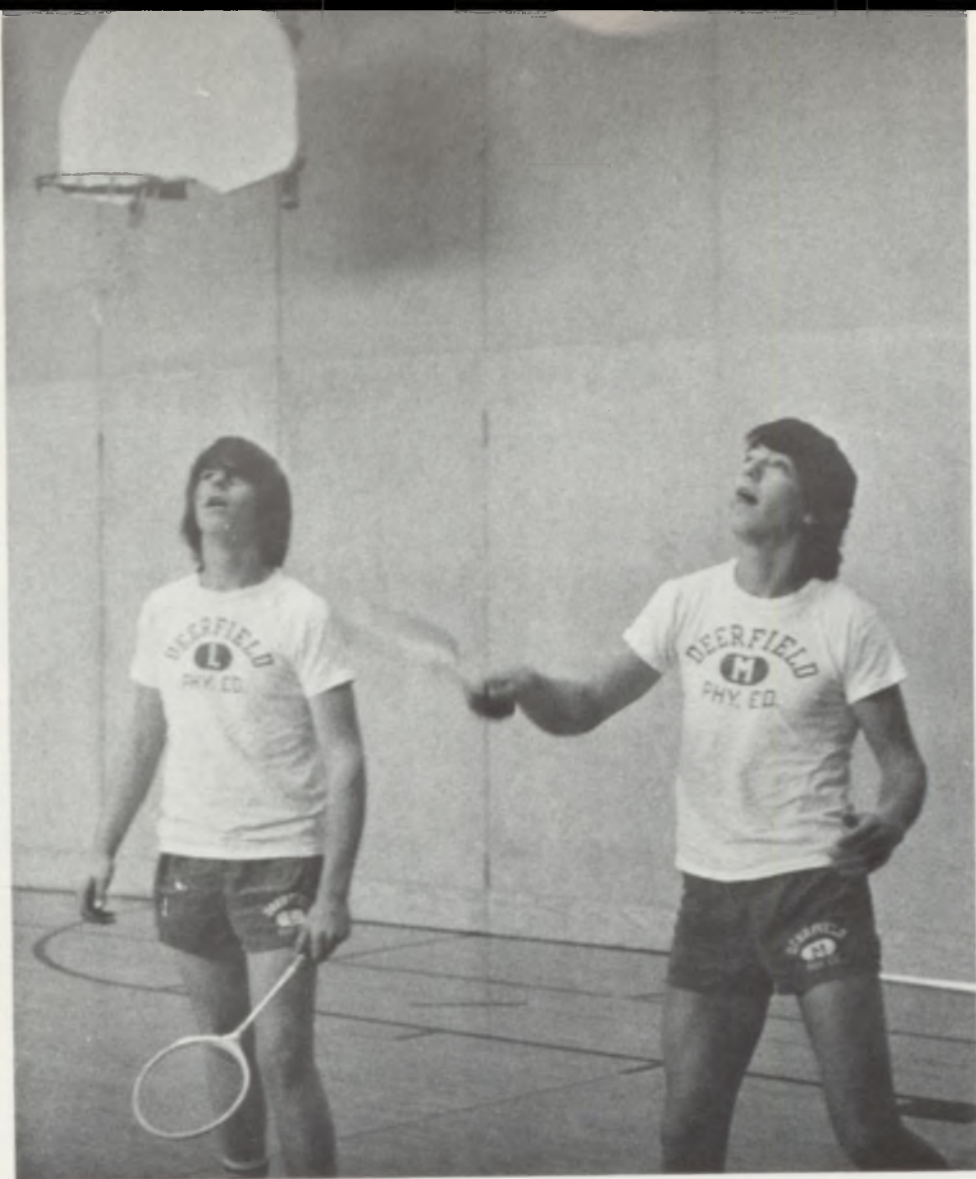

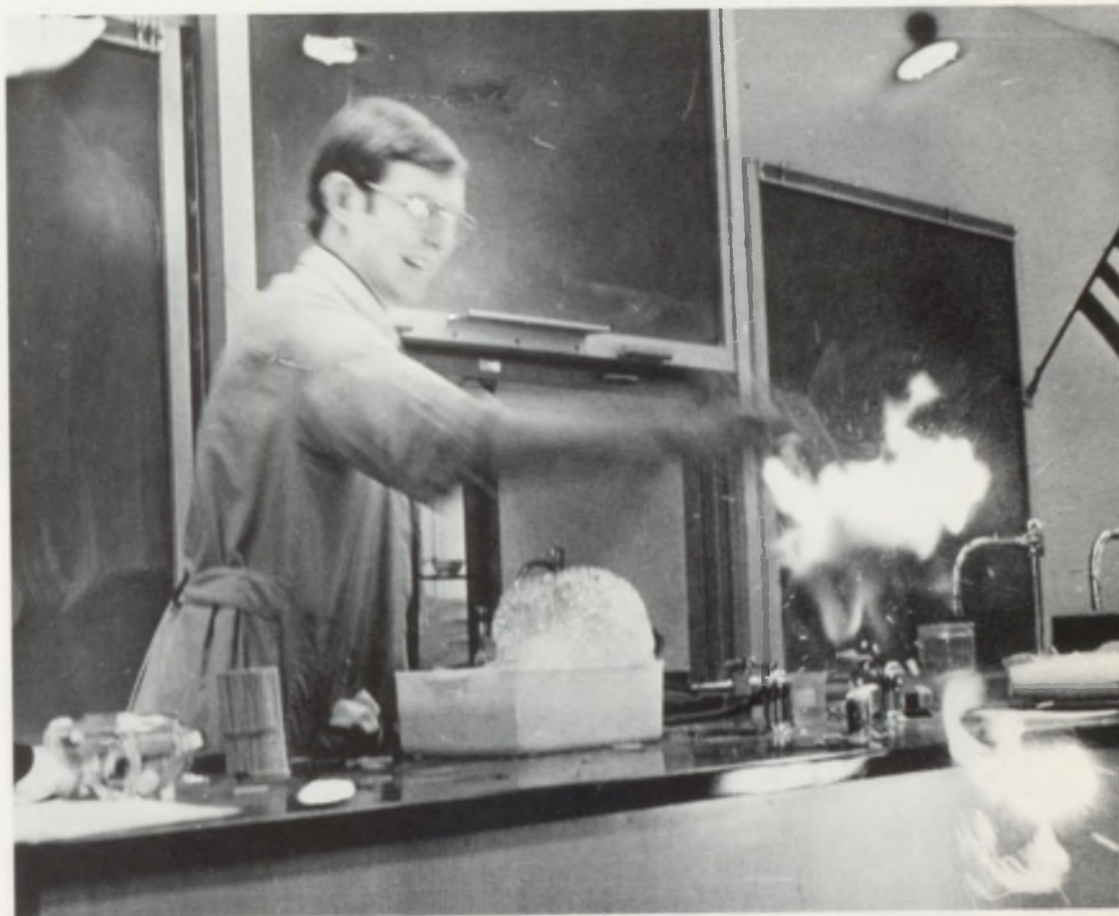

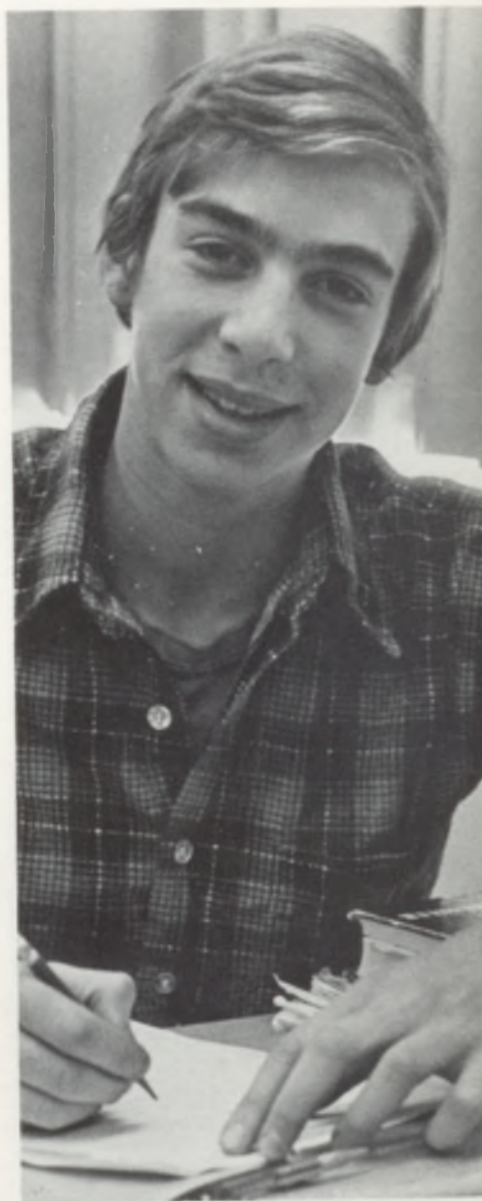
Math is easy . . . eventually

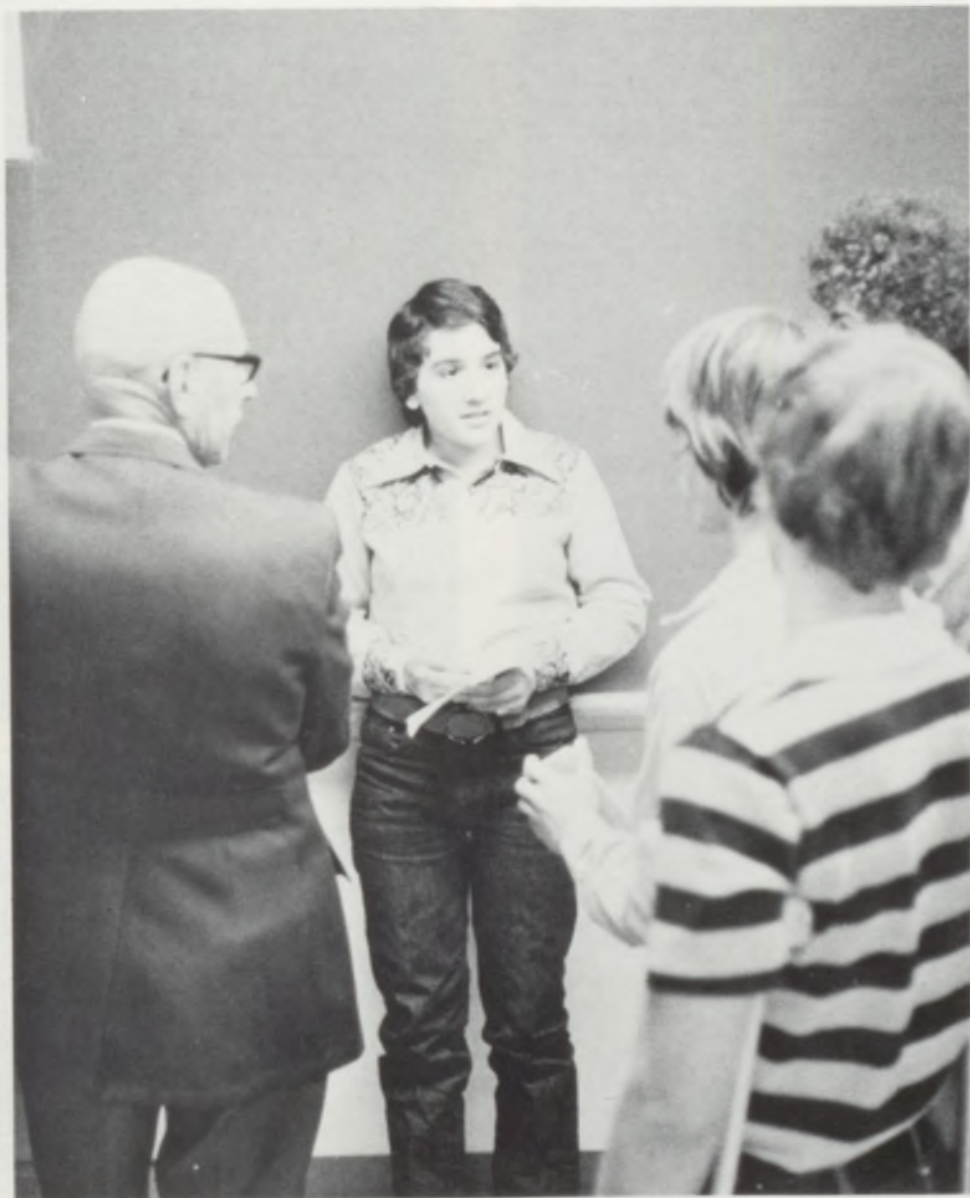

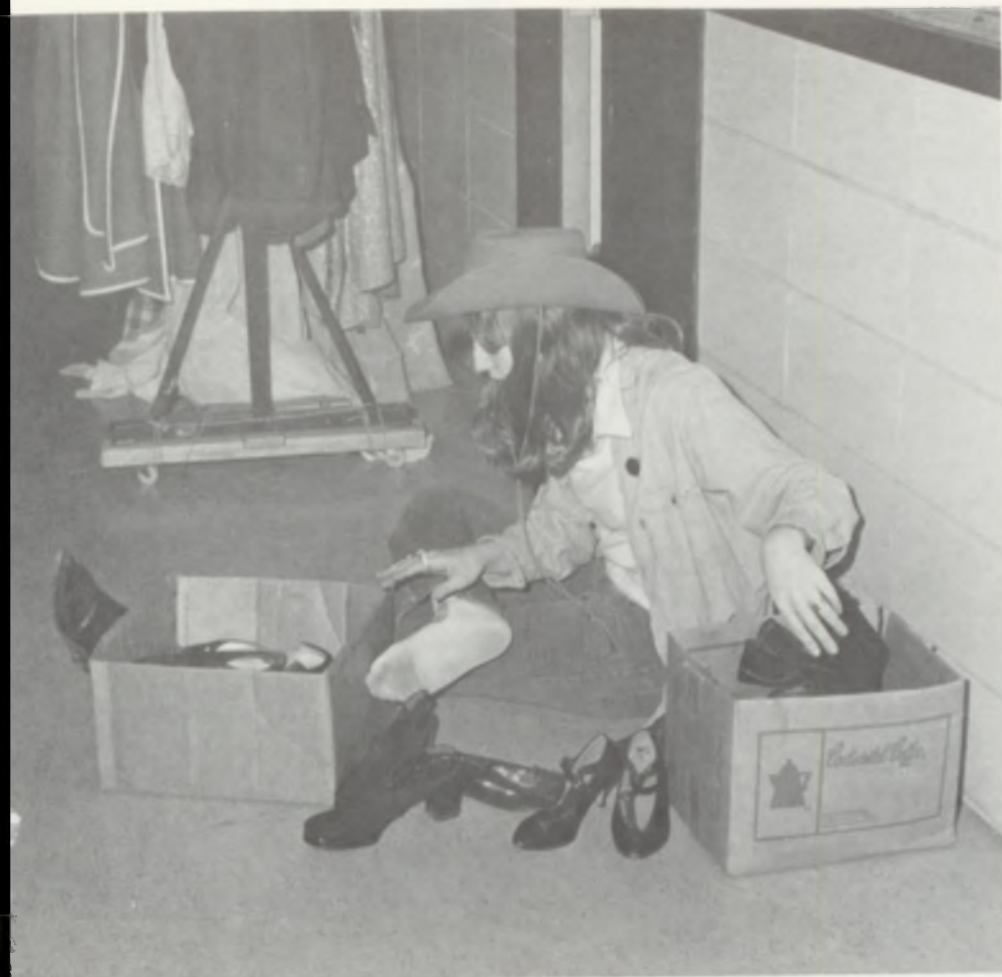

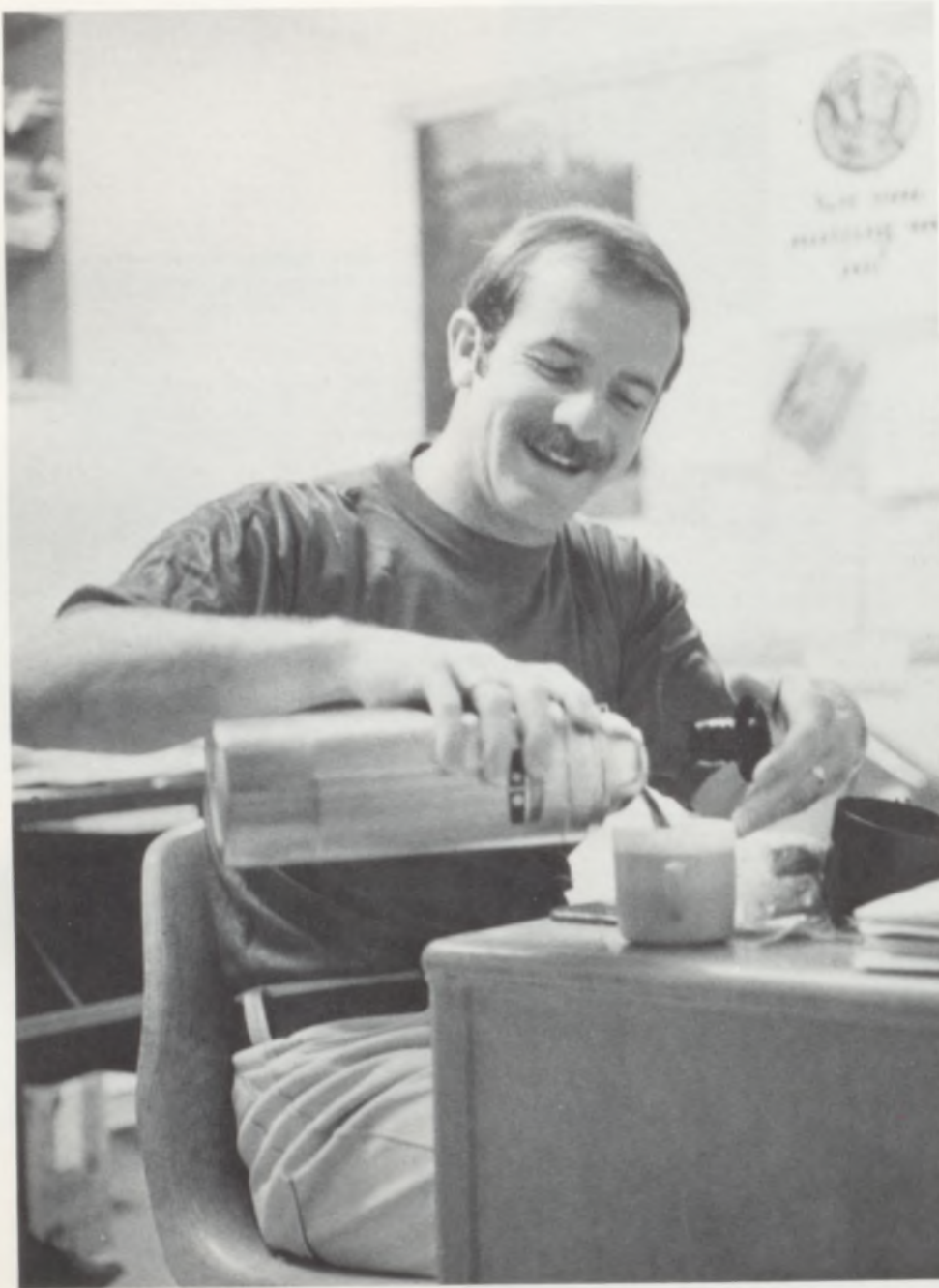
