






Worth Your While









his year's cast of the fall play, Don't Drink the Water by Woody Allen, withstood great illness of more than half of the cast and still produced a great show.









hat do Adventures of the Mind, the Mock Law Trial, and the band trip have in common? They are all interesting activities that a select number of kids at DHS have been able to participate in.





A disappointing loss to Notre Dame knocked the team out of the playoffs, ending hopes to defend last year's state title. But the team is already anticipating a successful season next year.



Booting to Victory





Such experiences included a Glenbrook North game which was halted half-way through due to lightning, and a triumphant 26-12 victory over Highland Park at a frozen Walters Field.


The freshman teams displayed an enormous amount of ability through-









benefit.


"The new room helped the freshmen learn from us," said veteran senior opportunity to wrestle with someone better." Freshman and varsity members worked more closely than ever this year.



The team finished with a 3-2 conference record and a 10-6 record overall.


Seniors Jon Ottenfeld, Jamie Tibbetts, and Gaydos filled the team captain duties.



S uperstitions and mystical customs are a big part of every season for every sport. Each team has one that is different and unique, a sort of tradition to help unify the team and lead them to victory.






Everyone on the O*Yad staff realizes how much the students enjoy the yearbook. This is what motivates the staff to produce such a fine publication.







The JETS enter many different competitions throughout the year. At these competitions each student takes two tests in different academic areas. Each test is an hour long.





Competition Stirs Musical Challenges





Having many places where students can go to receive help in any area which makes classes and life much easier.









This is just one of the many goals that the English Department has for next year and the years ahead.










These calculators became available this year at the bookstore. This computer-like calculator has the ability to graph information on its screen, so students get a better idea of how the problem looks.





addition to preparation for the AP exam.



Updated science curriculum attracts large enrollments

n addition to the new beakers, test tubes, and thermometers that were bought this year, the Science Department has gained more student participation than in any past year. "More students than ever are taking laboratory sciences," explained Science Department chairman Vincent Malek. "The number of students at DHS ranks way above the national average percent of students taking lab sciences."


One reason for the uprise in this area is because of the varied classes available to students. Just like the physics survey class, a new chemistry survey class is offered to students who le feel that regular chemistry classes would be too hard. Instead of teaching practical uses of chemistry, it emphasizes chemistry

n addition to the new beakers, as related to environmental issues.

Science teachers are also concerned about the traditional way of giving tests in multiple choice form. In recent surveys by science teachers, they found that many students find it hard to determine answers on tests when given four different choices. Thus, alternative assessment, essay and short answer, are replacing the multiple choice test.

Also more group projects are replacing book homework. "Science teachers are now looking at courses less through content and what the book is saying, and more the process through which the students are being taught." explained Malek.

The Science Department is overflowing with new and different ways to help science become more enjoyable.

Just like many other departments, the applied and fine arts has also gained the use of computers.


One class that has incorporated the use of computers is the Introduction to Business classes. This class uses the computers in a new unit which allows them to have "hands on" experience in the computer lab.

Overall, the Applied and Fine Arts Departments have had a great year.







CCRC and Nurse's office provide similar services

hese two may not seem to have a lot in common, but in actuality they both provide a similiar service.

The CCRC is used mostly by juniors and seniors who are interested in attending a college after high school. This process begins when a student fills out a career form and then puts the criteria for a college in which one is interested into a computer. Students come here during lunch, free, and before and after school. The trained staff answers questions and has books on different colleges so students and see and read about them.

Students find the CCRC very helpful, especially when the application process begins. Students get the help and advise that is needed.

Just like the CCRC, students go to the Nurse's office for help when

getting headaches over the college process. The nurse staff gives nonaspirin to students who's parents have signed slips. Ice packs are available for small injuries during P.E. Finally, for those students whose parents refuse to pick up their nonsick children, beds are available to lie on for a period.

However, the health office has rules that students follow. Every student must bring a signed pass from the class which they came, parents must sign a slip to be able to recieve non-aspirin, and students are allowed to lie down for one period.





Worth Smiling About






