## S'TUDENTS’ MINDS

Do you ever find yourself stuck on a math problem, struggling to write a thesis, or just in need of a little extra help in some of your classes? Fortunately, Deerfield provides various resource centers, namely, Math Learning Lab (MLL), WERCS, WERCS+, Language Lab, Computer Lab, and the Learning Resource Center (LRC), which greatly benefit the students' needs.

Serving as an environment where students can work on math homework as well as receive one-on-one attention nine periods a day, the MLL is an extremely worthwhile center. The WERCS complex, composed of student and adult tutors, is available to the students for discussions of literary themes and revisions of student papers. In addition to the WERCS, the WERCS+ provides assistance in reading
comprehension, organizational skills and writing skills in all subject areas.

For those students who are taking a foreign language, the Language Lab allows students to practice their listening skills through the use of videotapes and audiocassettes. "The Language Lab is a great way to learn more about Spanish, and I look forward to finding out what is going to happen on the video soap opera called 'Destinos'," said Senior Jeff Fleischer. The Computer Lab offers classes in word processing and has an abundance of computers for students to use before, during, and after school. COLOPHON - The 1250 copies of the 1995 O*YAD were printed by Josten's Printing and Publishing Company in State College, PA. The 9X12, 204 page book was printed on 80 lb gloss paper and was produced by the faithful yearbook staff at DHS. Body copy was 10 point Optima and captions were 8 point Optima. The fonts in the yearbook logo were Times, Nofret Italic, Stencil, Madrone, and Mistral. Student Life headlines were in 36 point GillSans Ultrabold. Bite Of Realty was written in 18 point GillSans Ultrabold. Academic headlines were in 16 point and 30 point Stencil. Sport headlines was printed in 32 point GillSans Ultrabold, 30 point GillSans Condensed, and 36 point Willow. The font used in the Scoreboard was 14 point Verticla $300 \%$ and 4 point Helvetica. The People section titles were done in 72 point

Willow and all other writing was Optima. Senior Tributes were printed in 8 point Optima and headlines were printed in 65 point Willow. The Real World DHS Style Logo was done in 43 point Times, 30 point Nofret Italic, 45 point Stencil, 40 point Madrone, and 55 point Mistral. The index was done in 8 point Optima. This was produced using Quark Xpress 3.2 and Microsoft Word 5.1. The book was produced on an assortment of computers in K130. Underclass and Senior Portraits, group photos and some candids were provided by Halterman Photography. Some sport candids were given to us by Pioneer Press. Sports team photos were taken by Visual Sports Network. The cover was created in four colors with help from Jostens plant. There is a stereogram in the upper right hand corner.
