

































TUNES


REMEMBER






CARE members sponsored discussions on issues pertinent to Deerfield students. One such discussion focused on the pros and cons of leveling students in their classes.








LISTEN TO MUSIC





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


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
Colophon

The 1250 copies of this yearbook were printed by Josten's rupusning company in State College, PA and produced on QuarkXpress version 3.2. The 9X12, 214 page book was printed on 90 lb paper and all color photos have spot gloss varnish.

Body copy was done in 12 pt Tekton, and captions in 9 pt. Student Life Headlines were done in 24 pt Lithos and 50 pt Madrone. Academics headlines were done in Fajita Picante 55 pt 50% black and Fajita Mild 22 pt. Organization headlines were done in Lithos Black 30 pt and Blackoak 70 pt 30% black. Sports headlines were done in Lithos Black 10 pt and Lithos Bold 42 pt. The Senior Tributes headline was done in Castellar MT 72 pt. Each tribute cost \$25. Folio Tabs were written in B VAG Rounded Bold 12 pt and all graphics were imported from Adobe. Other graphics were produced in Adobe Photoshop. Photos were taken by O'YAD staff members and Halterman Photography.

The cover is Craffline with a special embossed lettering and design. The grain is Cordova. The type is B-Vag Rounded. The endsheets are all done in Tekton, as are all of the "Some Things Never Change" logo. Index is done in 8 pt Tekton, and the letter headers are 20 pt Madrone and 14 pt Madrone 60%




