## A long time coming...

Shutan, and Mike Bramnik had played a lot of ice hockey before they entered Deerfield High School in the Fall of 1993: each had played on successful all star/travel club teams for over ten years. When they arrived, the Warriors hockey program was well established. but had not seen real success for several years.

Hrogress came slowly: in 1995, the Warrior's J.V. team. bolstered by the arrival of the "Smurfs" (Chris Affinati, Adam Imhof. and Kevin's brother Chris) finished in a tie for third place in the prestigious Metro North High School League: the Varsity team came together and surprised experts with a Final Four appearance in the illinois State Tournament. In 1996. the Varsity team traveled North and won the Moose Goheen Invitational Tournament in White Bear Lake Minnesota

Finally, in the 1996-1997 season.m buoyed by the arrival of Freshman goalies Jason Katz and Steve Procanin, along with four other freshmen, and continued development of Juniors Josh Holeb. Scott Boothe, and Yaul Nuara, the Warriors were competitive with the top midwestem high school hockey teams: shocking everyone with a fine finish in the Annual Loyola Academy Holiday Toumament, and then going undefeated in the 20th Windsor (Ontario. Along the way in this memorable season, the Warriors swept the season series from Highland Fark, beat Lake Forest H.S. twice and beat traditional foes Barrington, Glenbrook South, Loyola Academy (Maroon), and New Trier (Blue), en route to an overall (as well as league) winning season. Individual honors followed: Freshman Jeremy Glazman played in the JV All Star game: Kevin Gottschalk earned Honorable Mention to the All-State eam, and, along with Adam Imhof. Blackhawks Alumni Scholarship, and numerous upperclassmen were nominated to the Chicago Classic Tournament Team.

The biggest honor. however. was playing in the Red Division of the Illinois State Championship Tournament, reserved for the top teams in the state. This was the first time in a decade that the Warriors participated at this level. The team did not dissapoint. beating St. Rita High School and earning a spot in the "Sweet Sixteen" before the memorable season came to an end.
